Increase in Canadian Shipping

Ocean-bound shipping from the ports of Saint John, New Brunswick; Halifax, Nova Scotia; Quebec and Montreal, on the River St. Lawrence; and Vancouver, British Columbia, was fractionally oath greater in 1933 compared with 1932, despite a reduction of 48,450,000 bushels in the quantity of grain shipments which constitute Canada's bulk of exports.
