HEAT AND ICE BY ELECTRICITY

The electrification of household appliances in Canada makes a considerable advance with the passing of each successive year. In addition to lighting, there now are electric stoves, heaters, irons, toasters, washing machines, hair curiers furnace blowers, etc., in thousands of Canadian homes. Recently the most notable advance in this direction has been in electric refrigerators. The old type of ice box is steadily passing into the discard. In 1932 production of electric refrigerators was 19,454, an increase of 5.261 over the output in 1931, and an increase of 12,152 over 1930. The value of the electric refrigerators made in Canada in 1932 was \$3,133,253. They were made in 13 factories, all of which are located in Ontario.

The value of imports of such refrigerators dropped in 1932 to \$388.634 .from \$2,553,935 in 1931 and \$1,617,443 in 1930.
