Farm Values.and Wages

The average value of farm land in Canada in 1933, including both improved and unimproved land as well as dwelling houses, barns, stables and other farm buildings, is placed at \$24 per acre in an estimate recently issued by the Canadian Government. This shows no change since. 1932. Average farm land values range from 463 per acre in British Columbia to \$16 per acre in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Average values placed on farm live stock are: Horses \$52: milch cows, \$31; other cattle, \$17; sheep, \$4; swine, 48.89. The changes from 1932 values are slight except in the case of swine, which have almost doubled, having increased from \$4.73 to \$8.89. In the officiated.
