W. F. W. FUSHER, Burlington Wm. F. W. Mr. Fisher, who was of United Empire Loyalist stock, was a life-long resident of this community, having been born in 1854 on the homestead, settled in 1825 by his father, Peter Fisher. Mr. Fisher was a man of broad interests in the neighborhood and beyond. All his life he was actively associated with various movements for the raising of agricultural standards throughout the Province and Dominion. He was Secretary of the Dominion Grange for nearly 20 years. He was a member of the Burlington Library Board for many years, and it was through

efforts and friendship that the present library building was donated to Burlington by the late John Weldle, He was also prominent in the establishing of an independent canning factory, at the present location, in 1904, which was later taken over by the Dominion Canners. He was an active member of Trinity United Church, having served as Recording Secretary for 20 years. In politics he was a Liberal and was twice a candidate for his party in Halton. 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
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
