### St. Joseph's Church Formal Opening After Re-Dedication

On Sunday night a large congregation attended the formal opening of St. Joseph's Church. It has been undergoing re-dedication during the last seven weeks, and is now all completed. The work is one of artistic taste and beauty and is a credit to the town of Acton. It is original and substantial, everything pointing to enrich devotion to God, whose house it is. The ceiling is very rich, done in blue, interspersed with golden stars and stenciled with a very rich border. The walls are finished in a soft shade of cream and the windows surrounded with imitation sandstone. All the furnishings have been stained and varnished, which gives the church a very rich appearance. To it may be applied the words of the poet, Longfellow:

To him who built his great heart into these sculptured stones,  
And with him tolled his children, and their lives  
Were built with his own into the walls  
As offerings to God.

Rev. Father O'Brien, of the Basilica of Christ the King, Hamilton, offered to the Pastor, Rev. J. L. McBride, and the people of St. Joseph's Church, his heartfelt prayer on the work they have accomplished. He said it was one of the most beautiful small churches he has ever entered. 

## Lot Option to be Used Before June 5

### Special Meeting Arranged When Purchase Will be Made — Acton Pumping System Very Efficient

A meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission was held on Monday afternoon, when Commissioners R. J. Kerr, L. G. King and Reeve E. Thetford were present. The Secretary was instructed to send notification to a consumer that unless the deposit was paid the service was to be discontinued. Notice of the annual summer convention was received and read. It will be held the latter part of June. A letter from the Ontario Hydro Commission gave information to the local Commission regarding its powers and operation. It pointed out that the Utilities Commission operated apart from the Council, and was not under its jurisdiction. The Commission had no power to allocate all funds under its jurisdiction as it saw fit, or spend any accumulated surpluses. Upon motion, the Secretary was instructed to pay the following Hydro accounts:

The proposed new building then came up for consideration again, and the discussion was concluded with the following motions: Moved by R. J. Kerr, seconded by L. G. King, and resolved that the Secretary be instructed to procure necessary papers and get the proper information re the option procured from Mr. D. H. Lindsay on lot 12, block 13E, Mill Street, and get titles searched, employing Mr. Farmer to do the necessary work and present the same to Acton Public Utilities Commission so that if found satisfactory the lot can be bought before the option expires, on June 5th.

Moved by L. G. King, seconded by R. J. Kerr, that this Commission adjourn to meet again on June 4th. The Superintendent was instructed to have installed a 1 1/2 inch service on Fairview Avenue, replacing the present service, which had been found inadequate for the consumers there. The service on Church Street and on Mill Street to Mr. F. Cleave's house, which have been found were not low enough to be below the frost line, were to be replaced properly.

The Superintendent gave the Commission figures on the pumping of water at the spring. The Ontario Commission had drawn it to the attention of the officers that Acton was not using as much electric power to pump its supply of water as was being used in smaller centres. Test metres had been put on the system and it was found that all the power required was being properly measured. The Commission was well pleased with the efficiency of the system. The data was ordered to be filed for reference. The figures given were for four days' pumping in May. A total of 134,000 gallons had been pumped and 120 k. w. hours used. The pump at the spring delivered during this test approximately 4,300 gallons per hour.

## Memorial Service in Acton on Sunday

### New Entrance to Pioneers' Cemetery Has Been Secured—All in Readiness for the Sunday Service

Plans are almost completed and will be fully finished in plenty of time for the Memorial Service in the Acton Pioneers' Cemetery on Sunday next, June 3rd, commencing at three o'clock. Day-light Saving Time. A visit to this spot last evening showed that the new entrance, recently purchased from Knox Church, off Knox Avenue, has been graded and opened. The leveling of the ground, while not finished, is getting well under way. The seeding and proper preparing will, of course, take several years. The memorial has been thoroughly cleaned and the aged stones are now all quite legible. The finishing touches are being put on the cement work.

The singing at the service will be led by a male choir and Acton Citizens' Band, under the direction of Mr. Bert Mason. The invocation will be given by Rev. H. L. Bennis, M. A., and the scripture readings by Mr. G. R. Easter and Rev. H. Brillinger. The words of dedication of the memorial will be given by Rev. C. L. Poole, B. D. "Narration of Steps in the Erection of the Memorial" will be given by Mr. N. F. Moore, Secretary of the Trustees of 1933, and Mr. W. A. Lasby, Chairman of this Board, will unveil the memorial.

Among the descendants of the pioneers who will be present and speak at the service are Mr. R. D. Warren, Rev. Malcolm Gordon and Dr. W. F. Adams. A registration of all the visitors on that day will be kept and it is hoped none will fall to register. In the event of unsuitable weather, the service will be held in Knox Presbyterian Church. The demand for the historical booklets issued in connection with the event, has been such that the first supply has been almost exhausted and a second edition is being printed and will be available in time for the service on Sunday. The booklet contains the program and a brief historical sketch of the grounds and a list of all the known burials in the cemetery, with dates of birth and death. A photograph of the memorial is also contained therein.

## Murray Committee, Commission to Meet

### H. N. Farmer Resigns as Secretary and G. A. Dills Appointed to Position

All the members were present at a meeting of the Murray Memorial Committee, held on Monday evening in the Council Chamber. The members of this Committee are Rev. C. L. Poole, Rev. H. L. Bennis, Reeve E. Thetford, Councilors W. A. Lasby, E. Jones, J. W. McMillan, S. M. Lasby and Mr. G. W. Murray, the Chairman, architect of Guelph. Mr. Mahoney, architect of Guelph, was present and addressed the meeting. He made suggestions regarding the building and was willing to submit plans and specification if given an idea of the requirements. The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Committee for his suggestions and help. Chairman Murray welcomed the representative of Tax Payers to this and future meetings of the Committee, in order that citizens may be kept informed of the activities of the Committee.

Reeve E. Thetford was Acting Secretary in the absence of Mr. H. N. Farmer. A letter was read from Mr. Farmer, asking to be relieved of the duties of Secretary of the Committee. Owing to his recent bereavement and increased duties he found it impossible to continue this work. He suggested that a member of the Committee be appointed to act as Secretary. He was willing at any time to render what assistance he could in any other capacity. Reeve Thetford reported that he had interviewed Mr. D. H. Lindsay regarding the purchase of the lot on Mill Street, and he was also assured that a thirty-foot frontage could be secured from the Perryman estate for \$700. Mr. Lindsay would give no option on his lot. Mr. Poole pointed out that it would have been better to have gone to the Public Utilities Commission regarding the lot, since they hold the option.

Reeve reported to the meeting regarding the proceedings of the Commission on the proposed new Utilities building. Mr. Murray and Mr. Poole both said they had been very favorably received when suggestions had been talked over with other members of the Commission. They had found Mr. King very reasonable and willing to co-operate if a definite plan were presented. Reeve Thetford said the street talk was very different from the talk of this meeting. Other members felt that a friendly feeling should be maintained between these two boards and they had found this co-operative bond existing when discussing matters. It was moved by S. M. Lasby, seconded by W. A. Lasby, that the resignation of Mr. H. N. Farmer, as Secretary of the Committee, be accepted, and that Reeve Thetford be appointed Secretary. An amendment was moved by Rev. C. L. Poole, seconded by Rev. H. L. Bennis, that G. A. Dills be Secretary of the Committee.

The amendment was carried and the motion lost on the vote. The discussion again centred around the relationship between the Memorial Committee and the Public Utilities Commission, which was concluded with the following motion: Moved by W. A. Lasby, seconded by Rev. H. L. Bennis, that this Committee request the privilege of meeting with the Acton Public Utilities Commission at their session arranged for Monday, June 4th.—Carried.

Arrangements were made by E. Thetford for this joint meeting, and a convenient time arranged for both bodies. The list of questions suggested to be put before the Court for definite ruling were then read by the Chairman. It was felt some of these questions were unnecessary and objection was made to others. Copies of the questionnaire were taken home by Committee members for perusal before the next meeting, when they could be proceeded with more readily. Moved by E. Jones, seconded by J. W. McMillan, that the meeting adjourn, to meet at the call of the Chairman.

## Entered Into Rest

### MRS. THOMAS STATHAM

A life that has been spent entirely in the development of this section from pioneer days was closed on Friday when Mrs. Thomas Statham passed away at her home on Church Street, in her ninetieth year. Born near Ballinacree, she has spent her entire life in this district. She was, before her marriage, F. Thoburn Ann Thompson, a daughter of the late James Thompson, and was the last surviving member of that family. On January 15th, 1857, she was joined in holy wedlock to Thomas Statham. The young couple started in the baking business in Georgetown, and it was on the first Dominion Day that the products of Statham's bakery were offered to the public. Later they removed to Acton and successfully carried on the business, which is still owned and operated by their daughter, Mrs. Edwards, and son, Mr. Harry Statham. Mrs. Statham passed away December 15th, 1933. In January, 1917, this couple observed their golden wedding anniversary while visiting at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Bunting, in Milwaukee. Until five months ago, Mrs. Statham had enjoyed the best of health. Always bright and active, she took a keen interest in all activities, and her birthday occasions and family gatherings were times of great joy to her. Mrs. Statham was a kindly woman and with all she has enjoyed the highest esteem. Of a family of nine children, six survive. They are: Mrs. J. L. Flynn, of Palmer Lake, Colo.; Mrs. H. R. Bunting, Milwaukee, Wis.; W. J. Statham, of London; Esch, of Bradford; and Mrs. Geo. Edwards and Harry, in Acton. Two daughters, Mrs. W. Smith and Mrs. W. H.
