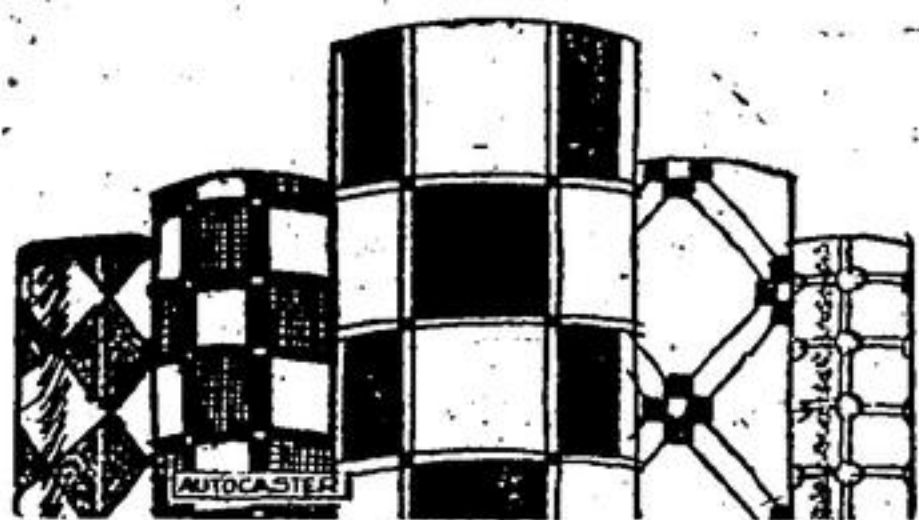

The Premier's manifesto has arrived and we have all read it carefully. It is a heavily worded document but when carefully considered isn't it really just a list of admissions by Mr. Henry of things he should have done during his term of office, coupled with a promise that if he is given another chance he will do what he should have done. Let us analyze it:

HYDRO—The twenty year Hydro contracts for rural users is being reduced to five years. This is a grievance that the farmers of this Province have had to put up with for many years. The farmer wanting Hydro power has practically had to mortgage his farm for twenty years in order to get power, while the urban user did not have to incur any such liability. Mr. Henry has for many years been a member of the Government and for the past four years has been Premier. Rural users have for years made fruitless efforts to have this injustice remedied. It is only now on the eve of an election and when public feeling has become so aroused through the misdoings of the present Government that the Premier has decided that this evil should be remedied. There are many other things to be cleaned up about Hydro. What about them? Is Mr. Henry going to equalize rates to consumers? Is he going to stop the plundering of Hydro through the purchase of power from private companies and individuals? Does he approve of the payment of \$50,000.00 to Mr. John Aldred, Jr., in connection with the Madawaska purchase by the Hydro Commission in 1929, and does he also approve of the payment of \$125,000 to the same gentleman according to Mr. R. O. Sweeney, President of the Beaulieu Company, as a subscription to the funds of the Ontario Conservative party about the time the Hydro bought a block of power from that company? If he does not approve of all of these things which have shocked the public conscience, why is he silent about them? The people of this Province have an investment of nearly three hundred millions of dollars in its Hydro-Electric enterprise, one of the largest commercial undertakings in the world to-day. We were justly proud of it until recent years. What would Sir Adam Beck say and do if he were alive to-day? We all know what will happen to the system if it is not immediately taken out of politics. I pledge myself to help in doing this, if elected, and I also pledge myself to a thorough investigation of wrong-doings in connection with the Hydro, and to a repudiation of all improvident contracts which have been improperly entered into. The rates should be adjusted. The Liberal party takes the stand that the water powers of this province, are a natural resource, owned by the people of the Province. The farmers on the back concessions have a right to share in this natural resource. The Abitibi scandal is fresh in your minds. The facts are indisputable. I again present them to you so that you may judge for yourself. A private company succeeded to develop them. Mr. Henry bought \$25,000.00 of their bonds, presumably expecting to make a profit on them; an insurance company, of which Mr. Henry is a director, owned \$200,000.00 of these bonds. Mr. McEighan, a member of the Hydro commission, owned \$3,000.00 of these bonds, and companies, in which he was interested, held bonds amounting to \$218,000. This private company developing the Abitibi water power got into financial difficulties; a receiver was appointed; the selling price of the bonds depreciated on the market to go as low as \$30.00 per share and the company were unable to go on with development. At this juncture an application was made to the Ontario government to take over the work. As a result of negotiations, the government headed by Mr. Henry, and with the approval of the commission, decided to offer the bondholders twenty years debentures worth \$90.00 each for those debentures of the private company of doubtful value. The Government were immediately criticized for buying debentures of a bankrupt company at far in excess of their market price. Many of you remember hearing Mr. Henry over the radio at a Conservative gathering at the Royal York, assuring his audience that his Government did not consider it proper to purchase these securities at bargain counter price, so use his own words. Many people wondered at the time why these security holders should be singled out as a preferred class. Who hasn't had to accept "bargain counter price" for property, goods and securities during present conditions? What the Premier did omit to tell his audience was the fact that he himself, was holding \$25,000.00 of these bonds. These are the facts and they are not disputed or questioned by anyone. In order to quiet the indignation which they created, propaganda was

started, featuring the "spayed bonnet" of the Premier. Many of you now are doubting receiving free of charge a publication known as the "Straight Furrow." Isn't this going just a little too far? It is hardly complimentary to the intelligence of the electorate to suggest the people to cheer for such a performance. Many people believe that when the election is over the people will by their vote say that they demand a Premier, whose attitude in public life is just a "woo bit" more sensitive to honesty.

NEW ROAD POLICY—"The Province proposes now to assume ninety per cent. of the cost of the King's Highway system. This change will distribute more equitably the cost of our main highways." Mr. Henry now admits the present system of charging part of the cost of the King's Highways to the Counties, through which they pass, is not equitable. Where has he been all these years while he was Minister of Highways and later Premier, if he has just discovered now that the Counties are paying too much of the cost of main highways? Mr. Higburn has promised, if elected, to charge the Counties nothing. The Government is now collecting in gasoline tax and license fees over twenty millions of dollars annually. Instead of using this money for highway purposes, and relieving the Counties from the twenty per cent. highway tax, the money has been used for other purposes. This County of Halton has already three main highways crossing it and is bearing an unbearable burden of taxation on account of them. It is proposed now to build a fourth, and as a last minute bid for votes the Government admits at last that the present system of taxation is "inequitable," and promises to reduce the charge to ten per cent. Few of us stop to think of the amount of money collected through the gas tax. I have not had time to check up the whole County, but I have checked carefully one of the towns and I find it paid last year in gas tax over \$26,000.00. How much of this money is being spent in your community, and how much of it is going to pay salaries of \$14,000.00 per year to heads of commissions who are only doing part time work? How many of you, my readers, are earning fourteen thousand dollars per year? How many of you think a chairman of a Government commission should be receiving this amount per year when the same man is already drawing salaries as president or director of private concerns and drawing down large salaries from these sources? The Liberal stand is that when a man becomes a public servant there should be no interlocking directorates; he should serve the public solely.
