

MUNICIPALITY OF ACTON

The Tax Notices for 1934 have been sent out. The place of payment is the same this year as last, and taxes are payable in-two instalments at the Public Utilities Commission Office.

> FIRST INSTALMENT — SEPTEMBER 17th SECOND INSTALMENT - NOVEMBER 19th

Any ratepayer may pay the whole of his taxes on or before September 17. but one-half the amount must be paid on or bedore that date. Failure to comply with this arrangement entails extra expenses and trouble. An addition of five per cent, will be made to every tax rate or assessment remaining unpaid fourteen days after the said 17th day of September, for the first instalment, and the 19th day of November for the second instalment; and it will be the duty of the Collector immediately after the said several dates appointed for payment, to collect at once, by distress or otherwise, under the provisions of the Statute in that behalf, all such taxes, or instalments of taxes.
