Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Hill, Jr., are leaving this week for Goderich, where Mr. Hill has been appointed day operator.

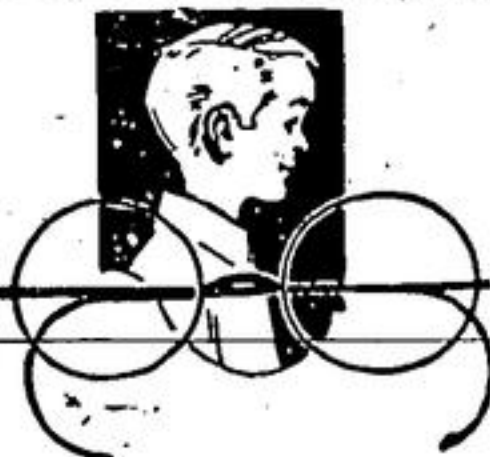
