> Monday morning we crossed over the Lewiston bridge to the States, en route to Old Fort Niagara, which was preparing for its three-day celebration of the Four Nations interested in the restoration and preservation of the Old Fort.

In passing over the moat bridge and

through the gates of the castle, we metaphorically stepped back over three hunstriking evidence of the privation and hardships of those who fought in the cause of freedom. In the castle kitchen was a large brick oven where bread was baked for the men of the garrison. Here also were many crude utensils and culinary implements. In the guard room one large bunk was built the entire length of the room, higher at the head than the foot to ensure light repose for the sleepers! Another room was the Jesuit chapel, with the original altar and crucifix. A curloous musty smell was noticeable in the cell used for solitary confinement. A chain and shackle was in one corner and in this cell without light or ventilation, a man was imprisoned for two years, and was found to be totally blind when released. One officer's chamber was comparatively luxurious with a built-in four-poster bed, a comfortable leather chair, clothes chest, table and an open fireplace. The attic, which ran the full length of the castle, was apparently a lookout and recreation room. From each window. which could on occasion, be heavily shuttered, was some kind of gun which looked like an antiquated machine gun but in that I may be mistaken. The I believe." windows on three sides overlooked the lake and as one looked out over the peaceful blue waters it was hard to realize that this particular place had been the scene of so much bloodshed. that in this same castle had lived men who died a slow death of want and suffering during what was known as "the Year of Starvation; when only twelve



## FARMS Weekly News Letter Fall Field Work on the Central Farm

Fall work is well advanced at the Central Experimental Farm. Fall ploughing has been in progress for some ten days. Early varieties of potatoes are now ready to harvest. Ensilage com should be in the late dough stage by next week when corn harvesting will be commenced. The Egg Laying Contest

Egg production in the Canadian Egg Laying Contest at The Central Experimental Farm this year has been uniformly high, and at the present time is remarkably steady. Many of the birds have already passed the 200 egg mark, Egg weights continue to improve. Fish Meal for Poultry

The results of an experiment conducted for five years at the Dominion Experimental Farm at Nappan, N. S., show that fish meal is an excellent substitute for other protein feeds for poultry, and that it is as good as beef scrap or beef ! meal for the poultry ration. During the test there was no complaint from consumers as to any fishiness or off-flavor n the eggs.

Winter Food Supply for Bees

Every colony of bees when ready for the winter should have at least forty pounds'of food stored in order that they may have sufficient to carry them through until new nectar is available the following spring. Only the best clover or buckwheat honey should be used for this purpose. Failing this, use the required amount of pure cane sugar made into syrup at the rate of two parts of sugar to one part of water.

### KING OF THE GYPSIES

From all parts of the world gypsy delegates have been travelling to the fortiess-town of Brunn, which lies at the foot of the Spielberg, 70 miles from Vienna. They are bound under strict Romany oaths and pledges of secrecy, for they are the bearers from their respective tribes of the ballot-papers which will decide who, of the ten or twelve candidates, shall be King of all the Gypsies. The last king, a Polish gypsy named Slivitz, died some months ago. Now the gypsies are wondering which nation-English, French, Spanish, Rumanian, Russian, Czechoslovah - will provide the new king. Gypsies of each country have put forward a candidate. Although anonymous, the king has great influence and authority all over the world, wherever there are gypsies.
