HALTON PRESBYTERY GATHERING

All Groups in Connection with the United Church Met in Milton on Tuesday Evening

One of the outstanding meetings of Halton Presbytery, Hamilton Conference, the United Church of Canada, was held in Milton on Tuesday, October 9th, with morning, afternoon and evening sessions. The Chairman, Rev. C. L. Poole, B. D., Acton, introduced five new members: Rev. J. W. Magwood, Oakville; Rev. J. L. Totton, Freelonville; Rev. W. D. Clark, Millgrove; Rev. H. S. Lovering, Trafalgar; Rev. F. Matheson, Burlington.

New officers were elected: Rev. S. B. Stokes, Aldershot, Chairman; Rev. G. I. Stephenson, Limehouse, Secretary; and Rev. G. F. Kelly, Carlisle, Treasurer. The Conveners of Committees were appointed and other business transacted.

In the afternoon reports were received from the representatives to the General Council at Kingston, Rev. C. L. Poole, Mr. A. MacLaren and Mr. J. M. Denyes.

Representatives of the various departments in connection with the United Church met in St. Paul's United Church, Milton, on Tuesday evening for discussion of the various phases of church work. There were clergy, church elders, stewards, representatives of the Young People's League, Ladies' Aid, Sunday School and choir.

A feature of the gathering was the interpretative leading in the singing of the familiar hymns by Rev. M. Stead. This leader emphasized the singing of the hymns to give expression to the words of the hymn.

Rev. S. B. Stokes, the newly-elected Chairman of Halton Presbytery, who succeeds Rev. C. L. Poole, had charge of the service. Mr. Stokes is pastor of the Plains charge, near Burlington.

The duties of the Christian church was the subject introduced by Mr. A. MacLaren and discussed by the various groups. Reports were made to the entire gathering by the secretary of each group, and gave a great deal of helpful suggestion in the advancement toward a better world.

The feature of the evening was an address by Rev. Dr. Cochrane, Chairman of the Maintenance and Extension Fund. Dr. Cochrane is a forceful speaker and his knowledge of the great work being accomplished by the church and the great need for the upkeep and furthering of this world made his address educational and inspirational. The work of the United Church and its wide-spread activities was outlined and the good that all churches are doing in taking the gospel to the remote places.

One of the main resolutions of the day was passed unanimously by the Presbytery and also confirmed by the unanimous vote of about 400 people at the evening open session. It is as follows:

"We, the members and friends of the Halton Presbytery assembled, commend the Government of Ontario upon their position with regard to liquor advertising and the efforts that are being made to enforce the Liquor Control Act in general. We do, however, view with alarm the deplorable conditions arising out of the opening of beverage rooms, for the free sale of wine and beer.

This condition is revealed:

- 1.—In the decrease of legitimate business, such as the sale of milk, ice cream and other wholesome food products;
- 2.—In the rapidly increasing number of traffic accidents;
- 3.—The very evident increase of drunkenness;
- 4.—The fact—which we view with very great anxiety—that so many of our youths, both boys and girls, are frequenting these beverage rooms.

We would urge all our people in Local Option territory to jealously safeguard that advantage and, if possible, in places where it does not obtain, to take steps to secure it."

HELP FOR THE WEST

An Appeal is Being Made for a Carload of Provisions to be Shipped from Acton

The need for assistance in Western Canada is still very urgent again this year. The dry weather has left many families destitute and wholly dependent upon the generosity of the east.

On Thursday and Friday, October 18th and 19th, the United Churches of this district have arranged for a car of provisions to be loaded at Acton station. While the arrangements for the car have been sponsored by the United Church, contributions are invited and requested of everyone who desires to assist. The distribution in the West is made without regard of the denomination of the recipients and solely on the basis of the greatest need.

Everyone is therefore urged to contribute as much as possible of foodstuffs to make up this carload and help those in the stricken sections of the West. Fatness, apples, turnips, groceries, provisions and foodstuffs of all kinds are required. No clothing can be sent in this car.

Chartered Banks Will Assist New Investors in Refunding Loan

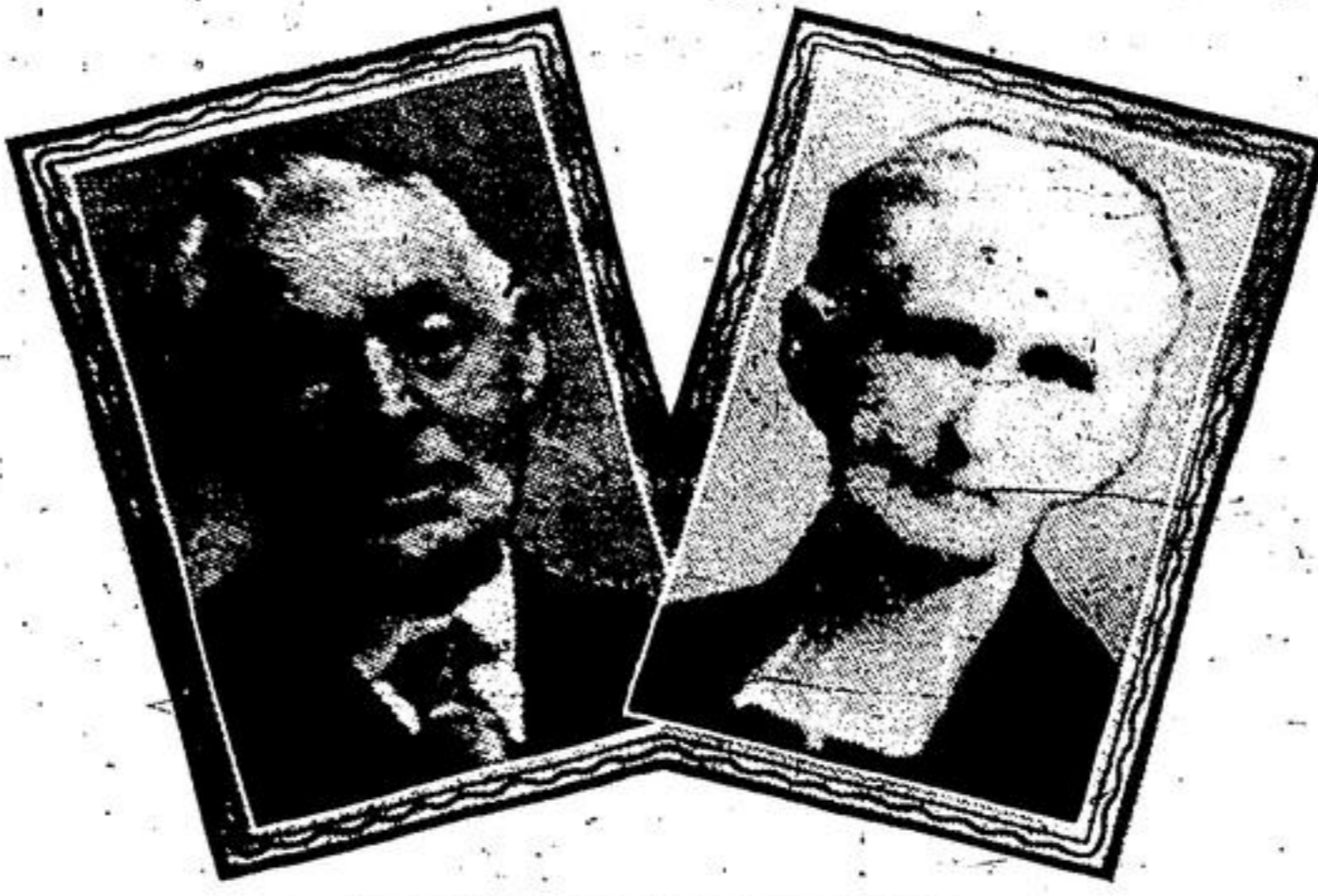
For the particular convenience of new investors who wish to subscribe in modest amounts for the bonds of the 1934 Refunding Loan, the chartered banks have agreed with the Dominion Government to loan up to 75% of the par value of bonds purchased by new investors. For example, a \$100 bond may be purchased with a deposit of \$25; a \$500 bond with a deposit of \$125, and a \$1,000 bond with a deposit of \$250. In each case the balance of payments may be spread over periods up to six months, and the bank will carry the bonds at 4% interest.

Mr. and Mrs. William Williams Who This Week Removed to Toronto and Will Reside in the City

REMOVED TO TORONTO

Mr. and Mrs. Williams, Who Have Been Residents of Acton for 59 Years—Presentations by I. O. O. F. and Neighbors

On Monday Mr. and Mrs. William Williams removed to Toronto to reside, where their son, Mr. Heber Williams, and son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Kilby, are now resident.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams are Acton's oldest couple. They are 86 years of age, and on Christmas next will have been married for sixty-five years. Few indeed are the couples who are spared to each other for such a span of years. They have resided in Acton for 59 years, coming here from Bowmanville. For over thirty-five years Mr. Williams was in the boot and shoe business in Acton, retiring several years ago. Friends here wish them joy and comfort in the new home in the city and among the members of the family. It is hoped that they will be able to visit Acton quite frequently.

Mr. Williams was also one of the oldest Oddfellows in the Province. Fifty-eight years ago he was one of the first seven to join Acton Lodge I. O. O. F., when it was formed. Mr. Williams recalls that five of those first candidates were: Dr. McGarvin, John and William Willow—and Jas. McLam and himself. The other two candidates he could not recall.

Last Thursday evening his brethren of the Three Links Order paid a surprise visit to the home, and presented Mr. Williams with a set of gold cuff links. Mr. E. M. MacDonald made the address, and Mr. E. Coles the presentation of these emblems. The aged brother made a very appropriate reply, thanking the Order for the remembrance.

PRESBYTERIAN YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONFERENCE

Interesting and Inspirational Sessions Held for Three Days During the Week in Toronto

The first Ontario Presbyterian Young People's Conference was held in Knox Church, Toronto, on the 6th, 7th and 8th of October. The Conference opened on Saturday afternoon, with the President, Mr. Ernest Woodie, of Toronto, in the chair. Discussion groups were very ably handled by various leaders of young people's work. In the evening a very enjoyable banquet was held in the Round Room of Eaton's College Street. Refreshments were received from all the Presbyteries and Mr. Richard Stewart, President of the Paris Young People's Society, was toastmaster.

At 8:30 the delegates assembled again in Knox Church, to hear a very inspirational address by Principal F. Scott MacKenzie, of Montreal College. Reports were brought from the City of Toronto by Controller Simpson, the Anglican Young People's Association, the Baptist Young People's Union, the Christian Endeavor and various other societies.

On Sunday morning at nine o'clock, communion was held in Knox Church Chapel, and was conducted by Dr. Stuart C. Parker, of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto. At eleven o'clock, the Moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. J. S. Shortt, preached at the 114th anniversary service of Knox Church. The delegates again assembled in the afternoon, and the worship service was held by Kenneth Saunders, of the Barrie Presbytery. Dr. Andrew S. Grant gave an address, "Deepening the Spiritual Life," and afterwards discussion groups were again held.

The final session of the Conference was held on Monday morning, with Cameron McTaggart, of London, in the chair. The presentation of group findings was given and these were reviewed by Dr. W. M. Kannavin. A group photograph was taken and a very interesting demonstration of recreational methods was given by Rev. H. M. Clutter, of Brampton. The final reports of the business committees were given, and the Conference adjourned about one-thirty. The afternoon was left open to the delegates for a rugby game at the Varsity stadium or a bus tour of the city.

The theme of this first Provincial Presbyterian Conference was "Study to show thyself approved unto God—a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."

A letter was presented from F. L. Wright, Secretary of the Acton Branch of the Canadian Legion, requesting the Council to procure their poppy wreath from them. The Council ordered the usual wreath and gave permission to the committee to secure the usual printing. The matter of insurance for the Murray Memorial Y. M. C. A. building was brought up. This was left in the hands of Councillor W. A. Lasby and Reeve Thetford.

Nothing has been done as yet about the baseball diamond, which is to be fixed up.

The streets and walks of the town are to be patched up. It was moved by W. A. Lasby, and seconded by S. M. Lasby, that the drinking fountain be removed from in front of the Post Office to a position in front of the Y. M. C. A., provided the consent and approval of the Women's Institute to such removal is obtained, and that such consent and approval be requested immediately.—Carried.

A motion was passed, empowering the Reeve and Treasurer to pay small accounts of the Murray-Memorial building fund between Council meetings, limiting the amount to \$50.00.

A letter from Lachlan McMillan expressing thanks for the flowers and letter of sympathy sent his father, was received and read.

A motion was put through empowering the Clerk to sign the deed of the Public Utilities Commission property, and to pay them the purchase price agreed upon. The deed was to be made in the name of the Corporation of Acton. The Chief of Police was instructed to take the account of the Western Hospital, Toronto, for an indigent, and collect.

The list of arrears of taxes was gone over and a number marked for court proceedings. Each owner, who was three years in arrears, was to be notified that they were liable for a tax sale.

Sentenced for Theft

In District Magistrate Bull's court in Milton, Albert C. Trimble, Arthur Dickson and Henry McGibbon, of Guelph, were found guilty of burglarizing Robert Bell's service station in Milton on September 2nd last, and each was sentenced to one year determinate and one year indeterminate in the Ontario Reformatory at Guelph. They had already been sentenced in police court there to terms of one year in the Ontario Reformatory.

Halton's Agricultural Representative Changed

A. G. Kirstine, for a number of years Agricultural Representative for Halton County, has been retired and J. E. Whitelock, of the Department of Agriculture, Toronto, has been appointed as his successor. Both are graduates of the Ontario Agricultural College.

Fires Interfere with Other Events

At Georgetown, on Saturday evening, the firemen had a call to a chimney fire, just as the crowd was leaving the Fair grounds. At Milton, on Monday afternoon, a fire in the downtown section interrupted the fall game and impeded traffic as the fans were leaving the town.

Two and a Half Pound Potato

Mr. D. McDougall brought in a mammoth Dooley potato on Tuesday morning that weighed exactly two and a half pounds. There was only one potato in the hill and the stock was a healthy one. One side of the spud bears a striking resemblance to a human face. The two eyes and nose are quite prominent, even if not in good alignment. The potato is on exhibition in The Fair Press, window.

Building Report

The splendid weather of the past week has enabled good progress to be made on the Murray Memorial Y. M. C. A. building. A staff of eight bricklayers at work said the walls will reach sufficient height next week to enable the placing of the joists for the second floor. It is expected that the second floor will be started very soon. The brick work and the artistic design of the front have been the subject of much favorable comment and general satisfaction is expressed as the building progresses.

The Weaver-Ball Wedding in Toronto

Bloor Street United Church, Toronto, was the scene of a quiet wedding at noon on Saturday, when Frances Elizabeth, younger daughter of Mrs. Ida M. and the late Thomas C. Ball, of St. Catharines, became the bride of Bruce Douglas Weaver, B. A., only son of Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Weaver, of Dunnville. The bride, who was given in marriage by her brother, James C. Ball, of London, was gowned in shell pink triple sheer, and wore a corsage bouquet of white cateleya orchids and lily-of-the-valley. Mr. and Mrs. Weaver will reside in Toronto.

W. M. S. Addressed by African Missionary

The Women's Missionary Society of the United Church held their monthly meeting last evening, when the President, Mrs. J. W. Barbere was in charge. Mrs. C. L. Poole led in prayer and Mrs. Annie Johnson read the scriptures. "Mothers of Salem" was a vocal selection given by six girls of the Mission Band, and Christina and Marion Nicol rendered a duet. The feature of the evening was an address by Rev. Mr. Banfield, of the British and Foreign Missionary Society, who travelled for thirty years in Central Africa, especially in the Congo basin. Mr. Banfield showed beautifully colored pictures of African village life, of their savage customs and later showed how successfully the missionaries were Christianizing Central Africa. Mr. Banfield said that Uganda was one of the most promising mission fields in the world to-day.

Two Highway Accidents

Two accidents occurred last Friday evening on the highway between Rockwood and Guelph, within two hundred yards. Dr. E. L. Mahoney and Dr. Orton Redmond, both of Guelph, were the most seriously injured. Dr. Mahoney's car, driven by his sister, Mrs. Doris Mahoney, figured in a collision with another automobile, owned and driven by Robert Moore, also of Guelph. The crash occurred almost in the centre of the road, and the damage to the automobiles was almost identical, both being smashed on the left front fender and axle. Dr. Mahoney, with severe cuts about the head, was the most seriously injured. His mother, Mrs. R. Mahoney, was injured about the neck and leg, while R. Dunbar, father-in-law of Mr. Moore, and a passenger in his car, received head injuries which did not, however, require his removal to hospital. Mr. Redmond was walking on the highway when he was knocked down by a machine driven by H. M. Taylor, Walmer Road, Toronto. Mr. Redmond had run out of gasoline, and was walking back from the farm house with a quantity of motor fuel in a wash basin when the car, proceeding in the same direction, struck him with the right front fender. Another car was coming from the opposite direction at the time. Both accidents occurred within two hundred yards, near the "half-way house," on the highway.

GEO. W. BEARDMORE PASSES AWAY

For Many Years Head of the Beardmore Co.—Had Been in Failing Health Since August

George Walthen Beardmore, of Toronto, for many years head of the Beardmore leather industries, whose plants are located at Acton, died at Wellesley Hospital, in the city last night, in his 84th year. He had been in failing health since August. He was a frequent visitor to Acton and the plants here during former years, when he was more actively associated with the company.

He was born in Hamilton, educated at Upper Canada College, and Felstead Grammar School, Essex, England. He embarked on a commercial career, and until within the last few years was actively connected with the leather trade in its various ramifications. He was one of the founders and a director of the National Life Assurance Co. of Canada, and at one period a director of the Canadian General Electric Co.

He was generous to a degree to Upper Canada College, and founded several prizes for general proficiency in the school. In 1897, the year of Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee, he was President of St. George's Society, and proved a real host at its several functions. From that time until the present year he never missed attending the annual celebration of St. George's Day.

He was a bachelor and an Anglican. His chief recreations were riding to hounds, golf and entertaining his friends.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. H. J. Fisk, and Miss Helen Beardmore, Meadowdale; two brothers, Alfred O. Beardmore, Toronto; and Frederick Beardmore, Montreal. Col. Torrance Beardmore and Gordon Beardmore, Toronto, are nephews, and Mrs. Gordon Mackenzie, Paris, France, a niece.

TOWNSHIP CONSTABLE RESIGNS

No Successor Has Yet Been Appointed in Eramosa Township—Co-Operation Given to the Poppy Fund

The Council for the Township of Eramosa met on October 9th, at 1:30, in the Town Hall, Rockwood. Present, Reeve Sims McLean, in the chair; Councillors Albert Lush, J. A. Stewart, and John Hindley.

Mr. John Henderson tendered his resignation as Constable, explaining that other duties would not permit proper attention to the office. The resignation was accepted, and no action was taken regarding a successor.

A by-law was passed on motion of Messrs. Lush and Stewart, confirming the new arrangements regarding payment of taxes.

Messrs. Fred L. Wright and H. J. Gibbons were present seeking the co-operation of Council with the Acton and Rockwood Branch of the Canadian Legion in the interests of the Poppy Fund and the Remembrance Day service. A grant of \$15.00 was made to the Poppy Fund.

On motion of Messrs. Stewart and Hindley, the County Treasurer was authorized to pay over any monies standing to the credit of the Township to the Township Treasurer.

A letter from the Wellington Fish and Game Protective Association was ordered to be filed.

Accounts amounting to \$389.45 were passed for payment, and Council adjourned to November 12th.
