Halton Does not Require Full Time Services of Police Magistrate

Request of County Council Answered by Attorney-General - Agricultural Representative Thanks Council for Co-operation During His Term of Office - Accounts re Oakville Subway Received from Railway Board - No Chairman of the Cemetery Commission for Halton.

Halton County Council met in Milton last Friday, with all members present, and the Warden in the chair. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted and communications read by the Clerk. Reports of Standing Committees were considered in Committee of the Whole, with Reeve George Currie in

Committee on Special Communications recommended that the letter received from the Attorney General's Department re the appointing of a Magistrate for the County be filed. The letter was as follows, and was dated August 30th,

the 28th, enclosing a copy of resolution, passed by the Council of the County of Halton.

"In the re-organization of the Magistrates' -Courts in the Province. it was found not possible to maintain separate court in Peel and Halton, inasmuch as the work did not warrant a full time Magistrate in each County. After careful consideration. Mr. Bull, of Peel, was appointed to handle the two. I am sure that if this scheme is given a trial, it will work well for everybody."
