# PRACTICAL ASSISTANCE

lalton Agricultural Committee Endorse Program to Eliminate Bots-Has Made Serious Inroads in Nassagaweya Township

At a meeting of the Agricultural Committee of the County Council, held on Friday evening last, the local branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture was requested to undertake a program to eliminate bot flies in Halton County. This parasite, as every horseman knows, is the bane of the horse's existence during the summer months. Annually our columns report accidents in the form of runaways, which are due to this pest. From time to time we hear reports of horses dying as a result of infestation from this insect. Confirmation of such reports was recently received from Nelson McLaughlin, of Nassagaweya Township, who lost two animals from this cause during the past substantiated by Dr. B. D. Young, veterinary surgeon, at Brookville, and A. Near, a neighbor. The post-mortem showed the stomachs of both animals tobe literally filled with the bot larvae. which had punctured the lining at many points. Acco:ding to Dr. Lionel Stevenson, Provincial Zoologist, and a recognized authority on this subject, 65% of colic in horses is due to this para-

Fortunately there is a simple method of getting rid of the horse bot fly and its cousins, the nose and chin bot flies. A number of individual farmers, and also a group of farmers in the Brookville area had their horses treated last winter. A number of these men were interviewed recently by Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock, and all expressed themselves as well satisfied. E. S. and John Simpson, both supported the treatment by saying "It was a good thing-our horses responded to their feed much better, and it eliminated touble driving in the field." Similar statements were made by John Carton Thos. Amos. Grant Campbell. Nelson McLaughlin, A. Near, all of Nassagaweya; and Joe Pickett, of Nelson Town-

We understand that plans are already under way to hold a number of barn meetings, throughout the County, which the subject will be discussed by Dr. Lionel Stevenson, of Guelph. Following this, it is expected that with the assistance of interested organizations an effort will be made to organize the County so that this pernicious parasite will be eliminated in Halton.
