A feat requiring considerable skill was accomplished last week, when the large brick building, at the corner of Guelph and Main Streets, known in years gone by as the old Thompson House, was successfully removed to the rear of the lot, some thirty-two feet from its former location.

Mr. Justice Makins gave judgment in Weekly Court at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, confirming a report in which W. N. Munro, local Master at Milton of the Supreme Court of Ontario, found that a total of \$2,486.17 was due the Town of Georgetown by the National Trust Company as executor of the estate of the late Edward McCannan, for taxes and penalties on overdue taxes collected by Edward McCannan in 1924, 1925, 1926 and 1927, and for interest on such collections.

The Local Master placed the amount collected at \$247.28 for taxes, \$17.61 for overdue taxes, \$1484.74 for penalties for non-payment of taxes, and \$736.54 for interest. The Local Master made his report upon a reference made to him by a judgment of the late Mr. Justice Garrow—Herald.
