Sir Donald Mann Died on Saturday

(Continued from Page One)

pleted, Sir Donald departed for Chile, where he spent a year fighting Spaniards' and Indians and constructing a railway for the Government, again associated with Sir Herbert Holt. When his work in Chile, was completed, Sir Donald returned to Canada and went West again, on this occasion to build the Regina & Long Lake Railway, 250 miles from Regina to Prince Albert. For three years the same group continued railway construction in the West, building the Calgary & Edmonton line and the line from Calgary to Macleod.

When it was apparent that all possible railway lines in the West had been built by the MacKenzie, Mann & Company and the Canadian Pacific Railway group, Mr. Mann turned to British Columbia as the avenue of his endeavors. There, for three years, until 1895, he devoted himself to mining and the development of natural resources. He opened up several mining properties, which proved to be successful.

In 1909 Sir Donald and his partner secured bond guarantees from Alberta and Saskatchewan to build lines in the two Provinces. They also negotiated an agreement with the British Columbia Government for a guarantee of Canadian Northern funds to complete the line from Yellowhead Pass to Vancouver, at a cost of \$35,000 a mile. Sir Donald's career then became the career of a great Canadian developing a transcontinental

Tae firm of MacKenzie, Mann & Company gradually controlled 5.000 miles of railway, including lines in Ontario. With its railway system, it built two oceangoing vessels, named the Royal Edward and the Royal George, which were, at the time, the fastest in the British-Canadian service. As the work proceeded Sir William raised the finances, while Sir Donald directed the actual work.

It is a co-incidence that the birthplace of the late James J. Hill, one of the great railway builders of the United States, was at Rockwood, only six or seven miles from the birthplace of Sir Donald Mann.

Sir Donald Mann was a son of the late Hugh Mann and Helen McDonell. and was born at lot 28, concession 4 Esquesing Township, on the farm now occupied by Mr. Arch. Mann. Later the. Mann homestead for a number of years' was on the second line, on the farm now owned by Mr. Joseph Flynn. His parents were natives of Badenock, Parish of Laggan, Scotland. His mother passed away in 1866, leaving the family of ten children. One brother and one sister remain: Alexander R., of Vancouver, B. C.; and Mrs. Jos. Alleh, of Saskatchewan. Sir Donald was the fifth child in

In 1887 Sir Donald married Lady Mann, was with him when he passed away. The other surviving member of his immediate family is a son, Donald Cameron Mann.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon was held with service at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, in Toronto, with Rev. Dr. Stuart C. Parker officiating. Interment was made in Fairview Cemetery, Acton, following the service. A wealth of floral tributes bore testimony to the high esteem in which he was held. The pallbearers were: General J. W Stewart, Vancouver; C. A. Bogert,

NEWSPAPERS FOR SATURDAY NIGHT PATH

Newspapers have a variety of uses besides furnishing news and helping the manufacturer dispose of his products through advertising. In many countries they are used extensively for wrapping parcels, while in Mexico they furnish fuel for the Saturday night bath. Water is heated in cylindrical wood-burning water heaters which have a small storage capacity and fuel ranges from old newspapers to wood kindlings, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Cooking is done generally over charcoal burners, which is practically the only cooking stove used by the peorer classes, while practically all of the homes of the higher-income classes are equipped with grates for charcoal fires. There is no use of coal for domestic purposes and wood is only employed in open firepiaces and water heaters, and, therefore, coal and wood stoves are unknown except in the area near the American border. Oil stoves are coming into greater use in recent years, the Mexican Government endeavoring to change the cooking and heating methods of the people in order to conserve the forests which have suffered serious depletion as a result of the tremendous consumption of charcoal. Electrical stoves, oven's and other heating appliances are used only by the more wealthy classes.


