At 8.30 Clerk Farmer declared the nominations closed and the audience chose Mr. P. E. McCleary as chairman of the citizens' meeting, to hear reports of retiring officials and to give the nominees an opportunity to address the electors.

Reeve E. Thetford was the first speaker and expressed the pleasure ft gave to give an account of stewardship of the year. He pointed with pride to the financial condition of Acton and the fact that the debenture debt had been reduced the past year by \$10,000. The mill rate had been reduced by 2 mills and he appreciated the co-operation of the School Board in this reduction. The overdraft would be lower, but he favored carrying an overdraft at the Bank. The uncollected taxes were even better than was shown on the interim Financial Statement.

The Reeve pointed to the favorable Miss Lottie Mason presented her with showing of the Assets and Liabilities and maintained that no town in Halton County was in such a favorable position. He predicted further reductions from the County Council owing to the fact that the Provincial Government was taking over the building and maintenance of Provincial highways.

Reeve Thetford then touched on the Murray Memorial building and outlined a good deal of the detail in connection therewith. He defended the instances in which the contracts had not beer given to Acton artisans and said in some instances the prices were prohibitive. and in the painting contract no tender had been received locally. The delay in the erection of the building had been purposely made. By this delay an additional \$4,000 had been available for the building fund. He told the electors to forget about the upkeep of the building being an addition to the rates. Councillor W. A. Lasby confined his remarks chiefly to the hectic time of the past summer on the Murray Memorial project. This matter had been one continual controversy from the first. He outlined how he and Councillor S. M. Lasby had implored the Committee to take the matter to Osgoode Hall, peaceably and quietly before proceeding. He told of the meeting in Toronto, and said that there had been no report of it in THE FREE PRESS that week, although the people had anxiously awaited the report. He had always wanted money spent in Acton, and not sent to Guelph, but he wanted any legal entanglements avoided.
