DIGESTIBILITY OF CHEESE

Cheese is made easier of digestion by combining it with other foods.

When eaten with bread, or other starchy food, such as potatoes or macaroni, it forms one of the most satisfactory food combinations and one which will not be difficult of digestion for most people.

When eaten at the end of a heavy meal, as is common custom, it may tax the digestive organs, but if eaten as the main dish at meal which is finished with a light dessert, it is not likely to cause any digestive disturbance.

When used in cooking, care should be taken that the cheese is not heated to too high a temperature, as heat will tough protein foods and make them harder to digest. Cheese is very thoroughly digested.
