Here and There

. A further concession to the travelling public is announced by C. P. Riddell, Chairman, Canadian Passenger' Association, in the statement that in future onemonth round trip railway tickets previously good for continuous passage only between departure point and destination, will be valid for stop-over at intermediate-points going and returning. For many years Canadian railways have been selling one-month round trip tickets at twice the one-way fare, less ten per cent., good for continous passage only. Now, the stop-over privilege is granted without any increase in fare and passengers deciding en route to stop over, may do so on application to the conductor. This concession, it is felt by railway officials, will do much to further promote travel by rail in Canada.

W. E. Allison, manager of mail and baggage traffic, Canadian Pacific Railway, has been elected vice-president of the American Association of General Baggage Agents, comprising representatives of all the railways on this continent.

H. C. Grout, general superintendent, Ontario district, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has been promoted to the post of assistant to the vice-president with headquarters in Montreal. Mr. Grout is a well-known and popular official of the railway in Ontario, where he has been stationed for a number of years.

Figures issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics dealing with operations in August of all steam railways in Canada having annual gross revenue of at least \$500,000, reveal that higher gross earnings were offset by increased expenses, including an expansion of over \$500,000 in payrolls.

Mrs. A. A. Adams, of Oak Bay Mills, Que., has been awarded first prize in the most beautiful Maple Leaf contest conducted this year by the Canadian Pacific and Canadian * National Railways. More than 10,000 specimens were submitted. The largest leaf phase of the contest was won by Richard Chambers of Vancouver, who submitted a specimen with an area of 2261/2 inches.


