Canada's Western Northland
"Canada's Western Northland," a Canadian publication to "Canada's Eastern Arctic," published in 1934, has just been issued by the Lands, Parks and Forests Branch of the Department of Mines and Bureau.

Health accounts for June amounted to \$648,70. This amount is \$550 less than a year ago. All workable men in the town are working, but unfortunately the town has a number to look after who cannot work.

Canada's Arctic possessions are geographically divided by Nature into two parts—the Western Arctic, reached from the Pacific Ocean and through the Mackenzie River; and the Eastern Arctic, which access is gained from the Atlantic Ocean and Hudson Bay.

Considered from this standpoint, the regional or local paper is even more important to the town or city in which it is published than it is to the owner or publisher.

Your town or city is not going to advance very far unless your local newspaper blazes the way. And your local newspaper is not going to be the sort of newspaper necessary to gain and maintain a complete coverage in the logical trade radius of your town or city unless it has the wholehearted support of your merchants and business men.

Aggressive business men in many of the small cities of the country are coming to understand and appreciate the importance of the home newspaper, and the day is not far distant when local Chambers of Commerce will make one of their main objectives an aggressive drive for increased newspaper circulation in the logical trade radius of their respective communities.

Wright A. Patterson, President of the Western Newspaper-Union, touches on a very vital subject when he says: "The circulation of large city newspapers in rural communities develops among the people of these communities the city buying habit. The effective advertising of the big stores attracts business away from the home town, and in time the home town as a market place has passed out of the picture. When it does, the local newspaper is buried in the same grave."

Considered from this standpoint, the regional or local paper is even more important to the town or city in which it is published than it is to the owner or publisher. There is no getting around the fact that the trade of a town or city follows the circulation of the local newspaper, just as civilization follows the flag.
