TO THE PEOPLE OF HALTON COUNTY:

In this letter I wish to discuss the issues of this election from the viewpoint of the farmer, but first I will refer very briefly to certain statements made by the Liberal candidate, Mr. Blakebeck, in his letter appearing in the Burlington Gazette of September 1st, and other newspapers.

Agriculture in the Hepburn Government made the statement that the next two or three years would see more radical legislation to assist the farmer than ever before.

When this deplorable state of affairs had continued for six months, creating widespread disgust and dissatisfaction, it was felt something should be done to offset the bad impression existing.

The policy of loaning money to farmers was finally re-commenced and actually continued for a few months. Then Mr. Marshall changed his mind again and the announcement came that farm loans had stopped absolutely and forever.

Events following proved clearly that this official statement by a Minister of the Crown was a deliberate deception.

1. The "regular channels for public borrowing" were not closed for within three weeks the Government borrowed \$20,000,000 instead of \$15,000,000 originally asked for.

2. The loans then being made were not financed out of money obtained from the "regular channels for public borrowing," but were financed out of the money paid in by the farmers themselves on their mortgages.

I challenge any person to name any constructive program to help the farmer accomplished by the present government. In spite of the pleas made by Mr. Hepburn for the man on the back congres-

sion before the last election, the farmer is still the forgotten man.

The policy of the Conservative party is found in the following words of Mr. Ross, Liberal-Conservative Leader: "Our policy is to stimulate the sale and wider distribution of Ontario's farm and dairy products at fair prices. We will re-open Ontario House in London, England, and other selling and advertising agencies wherever necessary to procure for our farmers a greater measure of prosperity."

Speaking at Sharbot Lake, on May 23rd, 1934, Mr. Hepburn promised to give the farmers relief if he should be returned to power. At Windsor, on June 16th, 1934, Mr. Hepburn promised to call a special session of the legislature to deal with farm relief problems immediately after the election. The election was in June of that year, but instead of calling a special session to help the farmer, Mr. Hepburn did not call the legislature together until the spring of 1935, and then he told the farmers that they must stand on their own feet.

At Westport, on June 4th, 1934, Mr. Hepburn, in referring to agriculture, said: "If we are going to have an industry that is sound, we must widen our markets." Following the election, the Ontario House in London, England, and also closed the Marketing Agencies at Montreal, Winnipeg and in the Maritimes. Ontario House had been opened by the Conservative Government and it created markets in England and other parts of the Empire, which increased Ontario farmers' annual income by \$10,000,000. Every farmer knows that one of his greatest problems is that of marketing his produce at a fair price. To close an agency which increased the farmers' annual income by \$10,000,000 was an act of incredible folly.

In spite of pre-election promises, the Hepburn Government did nothing to help the farmer after the election and did much to increase his problems. A bonus program evolved by the former Conservative Government to improve the grade of live stock was abolished. Grants totalling \$300,000, made by the previous Government to aid the farmer, were ruthlessly cut off. At practically the same time the Algoma Steel Corporation was given a bonus of \$18,000. Why take away the bonus from the farmer and give it all to industry? Why not a fair division?

Just this year, knowing that an election would be held this fall, the Hepburn Government made a reduction to the taxpayer of one mill on the tax rate. This was a very spectacular gesture, but we must remember that the present Government has increased the taxes by \$40,000,000. The former Conservative Government collected in 1933 almost \$83,000,000, and the Hepburn Government collected over \$22,000,000, or an increase of 80 per cent. All revenue is collected by direct taxation and of this increase the farmers have paid their share. Is this keeping a promise to the farmers to reduce taxation?
Speaking at Burlington, in the fall of 1934, Hon. Duncan Marshall, Minister of
