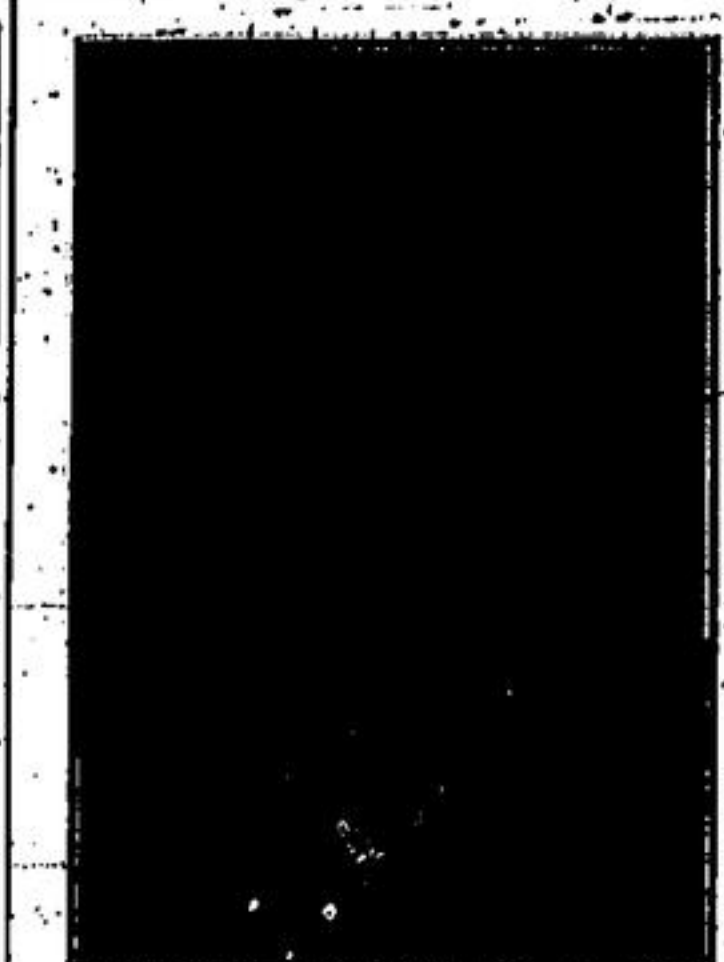

**TO THE ELECTORS OF HALTON:**  
In my letter this week I promised to deal with the Succession Duty question. As you are all aware, Succession Duties are taxes which governments collect from estates after death. It is admitted by all democratic authorities that in the main taxes should be collected from the citizens of any country in a fair proportion with services received and ability to pay. It is also admitted almost universally now that the accumulation of wealth in a few hands is detrimental to the public good because this condition can be carried to the point where large groups will be compelled to live in poverty. Keeping these two facts in mind, it is clear that succession duties properly imposed will not only raise considerable revenue, but are on the whole beneficial in their opinion. In Ontario in the smaller estates the tax is very moderate. When the estate is going to direct descendants there is no tax on estates up to \$25,000. As to estates in excess of this amount, a tax is imposed starting with 1% and increasing to 10% when one million dollars is reached. From these figures it is seen that the tax is not oppressive and is much less than that imposed in Great Britain and other countries. When elected to office, we found a startling state of affairs. The tax was not being collected in many instances. This tax evasion was being accomplished in two ways. Many years ago a block of Ontario bonds were issued as succession duty free. We found these bonds were being passed from estate to estate and were being used over and over again to escape duties. THIS PRACTICE WE STOPPED. Now the bonds are only used once for this purpose and are then bought in by the Treasury. By other means of evading the tax was by improper accounting. The first estate which we investigated was in London. The Henry Government had settled with the estate at some \$32,000 and then made a small refund to the estate for prompt payment. After proper investigation we collected from this estate \$760,000 and the collection was made without suit. Next was a Toronto estate, where the Henry Government had settled with the

estate at about \$80,000. We re-opened the matter and collected over one and one-half millions from the same estate. As we proceeded with our investigations, we encountered legal entanglements and in 1935 we brought in an amendment to the Succession Duty Act to permit the re-opening of estates which had been closed. This move was strenuously opposed by the Conservative Opposition in the House. The Act was passed and when I tell you that we collected in the last two years just over 28 millions of Succession Duties, you will see how well it has worked. We now have under investigation something over fifty estates which we believe have defrauded the past government out of over fifty millions of dollars. We are proceeding with the inquiries and are now meeting with stiff opposition. You are all familiar with the Byrnes inquiry at Hamilton. We ask for your support to enable us to carry to a conclusion the work which we have undertaken for you. We all know what will happen to these Succession Duty claims if the "old gang" get back into power again.

**Labour Question**  
Have you read Mr. Dingle's letter on the C.I.O. and the labor question? If you haven't I would suggest you read it. Mr. Dingle says that the newspapers have DELIBERATELY MISREPRESENTED Mr. Rowe's stand. Mr. Dingle says that he backs up Mr. Rowe on this question. After reading this letter I rather wonder whether Mr. Dingle really understands his own leader's position on this question, which he endorses. To put the matter bluntly, Mr. Rowe says as far as he is concerned labor can become affiliated with any union of its choice, whether the union sponsors illegal methods for obtaining its ends or not. His language is wide enough to freely permit Canadian workmen to join unions with Communist or Anarchist aims. He says that he relies solely on the good judgment of the Ontario labor. This attitude is a direct invita-

tion to all of the Reds in this Province to organize, to join organizations, which openly sponsor illegal means for obtaining their ends and this is the reason why the Hamilton Spectator and the Toronto Telegram have parted with Mr. Rowe on the C.I.O. question. Even Colonel Drew, who spoke in Burlington just a few short months ago under the auspices of the Conservative Executive, has parted with his leader on the C.I.O. stand. After reading Mr. Dingle's letter for the third time and sympathizing with him in the way in which his leader has been so cruelly misrepresented by everyone, I next join with him in his touching commendation of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and Hon. Norman Rogers for refraining from interfering with a purely Ontario question until asked to do so. Mr. Dingle must be terribly upset when he would go so far as to applaud Mackenzie King, I, with you, wonder whether this endorsement for Mr. King will last for another two years, until the Dominion elections are with us once again, or is it just a passing fancy.

And then the conclusion of Mr. Dingle's letter—what a touching peroration on the sterling qualities of the Canadian working man! Once again I suggest to Mr. Dingle that he under-estimates the intelligence of Canadian workmen. No one is going to be fooled by obvious flattery of this nature. No one has questioned the loyalty and sincerity of Canadian workmen. Mr. Hepburn plainly served notice on Lewis and his gangsters that lawlessness, as practiced in the U.S. won't be tolerated in Ontario. Mr. Rowe repudiated this stand, apparently with the hope of gaining the votes of a few radicals. Mr. Dingle says "Mr. Rowe has chosen the most difficult path." Mr. Rowe didn't think so at the time but I am inclined to think he leaves so now. I have taken a keen interest in labor matters all my life; my interest in labor is not a newly assumed cloak to help win the election. Mr. Hepburn's stand

is "approved by practically all of our labor leaders across Canada and has already shown very beneficial results." The Hepburn Government passed the Industrial Standards Act in 1935. This Act provides for majorities of any trade agreeing to certain standards as to wages working hours etc. and already thousands of workmen are benefitting by this legislation. The Minimum Wage Act was amended in 1936. The Labor and Industry Board is now appointed, composed of a Labor representative, chosen by the Labor organizations of Ontario, Industry has appointed another member, and the Government has appointed the Chairman. This Board has now been in session for weeks, compiling the necessary information to set up and enforce a fair minimum wage. No government in our history has done as much constructive work for Labor in so short a time as we have.
