TO THE ELECTORS OF HALTON

In this letter I wish to discuss the financial situation of this Province at the time we were entrusted to manage the affairs of the Province and the financial condition at the present time, but before doing so I would like to make a few comments on the temperance question. My opponent made a very serious charge with reference to the issuance of beer licenses in this County. He said they had been issued to "dives" and that there was political influence in regard to the issuance of licenses. This is a very serious charge for any public man to make. The charge is not true, and I have publicly asked for particulars. His only answer is that he is not going to be.

"drawn into a controversy as to the merits of any particular beer parlor." I am not suggesting a controversy, nor did I bring the matter up in the first place. Mr. Dingle made an absolutely unfounded charge with the hope of gaining a few temperance votes. The people are entitled to know the facts. I am simply suggesting that he should either withdraw the charge or make public the information which he has, if any, to substantiate the charge. I am pleased to see that he freely admits lobbying for a beer license in Burlington when the Town is already served by four licensed hotels. This admission is some guide to the electors as to whether his letter on temperance was for the advancement of temperance or for the purpose of attracting votes. As to his charge of political interference, I challenge him to name one license in Halton County which has been issued on political grounds. I have treated all applications on their merits and have not allowed politics to interfere. Quite as many licenses have been issued to Conservatives as to Liberals. The act was not passed by the Hepburn Government, but was left on our door step by the Henry Government. We have administered the act as fairly as it can be administered. If we had changed it without giving it a fair trial we would have been criticized. We are now suggesting changes by way of the appointment of an independent Commission. What does Mr. Dingle suggest? Does he want the act repealed or does he think it should not be financed by an independent Commission? The lower advertising campaign at the bottle which have been made out of the profits which have been increasing but this has been because the Government is getting all of the profits. During the last year of the Hepburn Administration there was actually less liquor sold and the profits in bonded just over two millions dollars. These figures are on record and sent for themselves. The people already know where the profits were going before we took office. That is one of the reasons we were elected to office.

Much has been said as to the financial condition of the Province which has been intentionally misleading. We have balanced the Budget as we promised we would. This is not disputed. We have adopted a policy of pay as we go, which also cannot be disputed. Mr. Rowe says we have increased the public debt of the Province by 100 millions of dollars. We say we have reduced it. I will explain where the difference of opinion arises, and you can judge for yourselves as to who is correct. Mr. Rowe takes his figures from the statement of the public debt months before the Henry Government was thrown out of office. Mr. Hepburn takes his figures from the statement of the public debt at the time of the first Hepburn Budget in the spring following his election to office, and this is of course after paying the debt incurred by the Henry Government. Since the 1935 Hepburn Budget in the spring of 1935 not one dollar has been added to the public debt. This is not denied by Mr. Rowe. You can judge for yourselves as to which is the fair and the honest way of accounting. There is one other very convincing fact to assist one in arriving at the correct conclusion. Ontario's financial position is so strong today that the interest rates which we are paying to-day are little more than half the interest rate which investors demanded from Ontario four years ago.

In addition to balancing the budget, we have reduced taxation. We have abolished the Amusement Tax. We have assumed the full cost of Provincial Highways, relieving the Counties of 30%. We have increased the Government grants to County roads. We have assumed the full cost of Old Age Pensions. We have assumed the full cost of Mothers' Allowances. We have reduced motor car

licenses. In addition to all of these reductions we have made a grant of one mill to every municipality in the Province. The total savings of taxation in Halton County alone which have been given to us by the Hepburn Government since we took office is over \$600,000, and I challenge my opponent to refute these figures.

This result has been brought about through economy and through an honest collection of taxes. We have not increased taxes but we have collected them and have played no favorites. In doing this we have made many enemies, but we have brought relief to the electors of this Province. Instead of a spirit of defeat and failure which existed three short years ago, to-day we have a spirit of confidence and optimism. I predict that when the election is over Mr. Rowe and his supporters will not find that the electors of this Province can be fooled by false advertising. Mr. Rowe says he is to be trusted. I put my trust in the intelligence of the electors.
