TOMATO COCKTAILS

Now that tomatoes are plentiful, the following recipes taken from the circular. "Tomato Juice and Tomato Cocktails." issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, may prove interesting.

TOMATO COCKTAIL (No. 1)

- 18 ripe tomatoes
- 1 cup chopped celery to cup chopped onlons 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 3 sweet green peppers
- 1 red pepper-2 tablespoons salt
- ' %. oup sugar Mash and cut tomatoes, but do not together. Boll for one-half hour. Strain through a coarse sieve. Add the viner and sugar. Boil three minutes: Seal in aterilized jars.
