Featured by an increase of 18,000 ounces in the output of placer gold, mining in the Yukon Territory in 1936 recorded a notable improvement over the previous year, particularly in the Klondike and Mayo areas.

Interest in mining continued to be centred chiefly in the operations of two companies, Yukon Consolidated Gold Corporation, which operates several large dredges in the Klondike area, and Treadwell Yukon Company, important producer of lead and silver in the Mayo area.

Elsewhere in the Yukon operations were mostly on a small scale, but they provided employment for a large number of men.
