Not in the Prize Money

Too often it would seem that the principle back of local fairs is lost sight of. The amount of the prize money won should not be the first consideration. If everything in connection with the average fair were paid for on a cost basis, it is doubtful if any of these events would exist. It is generally conceded that oft-times the prize money won does not cover the expense of getting the exhibit ready.

Fairs never were meant to be a money-making event. They are run solely for the promotion and improvement of agricultural products. That is the reason merchants and citizens, municipal and provincial governments render financial assistance to products, pride in improvements the incentive to do better next year. These should be the chief factor better prices always available for better quality.

Further Improvement Reported

Substantial improvement in Canadian employment conditions was noted in reports to the Dominion Buteau of Statistics on September 1st.

Reports from 10,336 employers showed an aggregate payroll of 1,174,041, or 30,581 more than on August 1st. This increase was larger than any recorded on September 1st for any year since the system was started in 1921. On September 1st last year 9,967 firms reported 1,014,532 workers employed.

The greatest gains in manufacturing were in food and textile factories, while moderate losses were reported in iron and steel plants. Among the nonmanufacturing industries, logging, mining, communications, transportation, construction and services showed improved activity while on the other hand employment in trade was quieter.


