Plowmen Compete in Halton Women Furnish the Banquet

Forty-nine Enter Competitions on Newell Farm Last Friday — Presentation of Prizes Made at Banquet in the Evening — Addresses by Prominent Haltonians — Ploughing Equal of Any Match This Year.

Halton plowmen again demonstrated their ability to stage one of the outstanding matches of the year at their annual match, held on the farm of Amos Newell, Nelson Township, on Friday last. The second match of a year ago, but they can be attributed to the unfavorable weather conditions and the backward season, which necessitated many plowmen concentrating on their own plowing at home.

Forty-nine outstanding plowmen from the Counties of Ontario, York, Peel, Wellington, Waterloo, Oxford, Haldimand, Brant and Halton vied for high honors on the splendid Newell farm, where conditions were well-nigh perfect. According to Judge W. L. Clark, of Gormley, and Wilfred Timbers, of Milliken, the quality of the work was the equal of any match at which they had officiated this year.

The event was brought to a successful conclusion by a banquet in the Milton Town Hall, where upwards of 200 plowmen and their friends enjoyed the sumptuous meal prepared and served by the ladies of the Mountain Union Institute, under the leadership of President Mrs. Wm. Dale. With Mr. L. W. Chisholm, President of the Plowmen's Association, in the chair, brief addresses were made by Warden John Irving, Mayor Carl Martin, Reeve John McEwen, of Nelson Township, Hughes Cleaver, M. P., and Tom Blaislock, M.L.A.

In the announcement of the awards and presentation of prizes, the Secretary and Treasurer of the Plowmen's Association were assisted by Fred Robinson, Robt. Fox, Reeve Victor Hall, W. J. Robertson and F. H. Gilroy. The program also included musical selections by the Bennett Orchestra of Kilbride, and solos by Hugh Beatty, of Milton, all of which contributed not a little to the success of the evening's program.

Another pleasing feature of the program was a vote of appreciation to a number of those offering encouragement to the Junior Farmers of the County, ably moved and seconded by two of Halton's junior farmers, namely Craig Reid and Donald McEwen, of Georgetown. Following a few words of appreciation to the ladies and other contributors to the success of the day, by Honorary President Stanley Hall, and Vice-President Peter Peddie, the program was brought to a fitting close with Aid Lang Syne.

ACTON SCOUTMASTER ADDRESSED THE GUELPH ROTARY

George Mason, Scoutmaster of the 1st Acton Troop, was guest speaker at the meeting of the Guelph Rotary Club last Friday.

Mr. Mason chose as the subject of his address, "The American Boy Scout Jamboree," a spectacle which he witnessed in Washington, D.C., last summer, when 30,000 Boy Scouts from all over the United States, gathered to attend the annual jamboree.

"It seems almost impossible that such a large group of Boy Scouts could be assembled at any one place," he said, "in Washington, near the famous monument, this boys' city, for such it could be called, hummed with activity during the time they were in camp, each boy performing the task allotted him."

Mr. Mason told the meeting that 15,000 pounds of meat was consumed each day, 70,000 eggs at one meal, 15,000 pounds of bread and two tons each of sugar and butter were eaten each day, together with 30,000 gallons of milk.

The speaker was introduced by J. M. Christie, and thanked at the conclusion of his interesting address by R. L. Torrance, on behalf of the members of the Club. Before the meeting concluded with the usual sing-song, Mr. Mason presented Dr. A. B. Ritchie, President of the Club, with a jamboree badge, a gift for which Dr. Ritchie expressed his sincere appreciation.

QUICK CHANGE RACKET TRIED IN ACTON

A couple of strangers endeavored to work the change racket on an Acton merchant last week. The first stranger made a ten cent purchase and took change for a ten-dollar bill. Along came another stranger and offered a five dollar bill in payment for another small purchase. He then came back and said he had small bills and asked for the larger bill back. The merchant perceived the racket and ordered him from the store. The car was parked on the highway, a block away, and the license number was secured and given to the police, who are investigating. The man working the game is always in a hurry and talks continually in order to confuse the shop keeper. It is a game that is worked frequently in many places, and is apparently quite profitable for the operators.

GAS STATIONS LIMITED FOR MIDDLE ROAD

Following up its policy of making the Middle Highway the finest in the Dominion, it is understood that the Department of Highways has made some very stringent regulations to govern all gasoline stations on the new traffic artery. Only a limited number of stations per district will be permitted, with building restrictions insisting on types of construction pleasing to the eye, of a uniform color scheme, and all pumps and tanks must be erected in the rear of the buildings. It is understood all oil companies will be permitted to participate in a proportionate manner in servicing the traffic, and that the Department can regulate the matter as they control a 100 feet on each side of the traffic lane. It is also understood that \$5,000 is the minimum on construction outlay.

White Crosses and Poppies --Remembrance

Nineteen Years After and Acton Citizens Conducted the Annual Service

Bright and clear, but frosty, November 11th, Acton citizens conducted their annual Remembrance Day service this morning. The first year following the close of the Great War, the Soldiers' Monument was erected here, and every year since there has been that time for a great bulk of the citizenry to pause in remembrance and an appropriate service. And so it was this morning.

The Acton and District Legionnaires, Louise Rifles (Scottish), the Boy Scouts and Cubs, the Duke of Devonshire and Lakeside Chapters of the I.O.E., the Women's Institute and Acton Citizens' Band gathered at the Town Hall. By way of Bower Avenue and Mill Street, the parade went to the Soldiers' Monument. Here, wreaths were deposited at the base for the Province of Ontario, Acton Council, the Canadian Legion, Duke of Devonshire and Lakeside Chapters of the I.O.E., the Acton Women's Institute, "C" Co. Louise Rifles and the Acton Citizens' Band.

Secretary F. L. Wright, of the Acton Legion, read the names from the monument, "Last Post" was sounded by Bug-Carrier Byrne, and, with bowed heads, two minutes of silence was reverently observed, broken by Reveille. The Band led in a verse of "Abide With Me" and Rev. H. L. Bennie, Chaplain of the Legion, pronounced the benediction.

And from the monument and its flower bed filled with white crosses and poppies strewn between the rows, the parade re-formed and went to the Presbyterian Church for the second part of the service. It was realistic. Every "white cross" bore an Acton man's name. There was many a silent tear that fell in remembrance.

At Knox Church, Reeve F. J. McCutcheon expressed the appreciation of Council in the response of citizens in this service and the help of all in arranging it. Rev. Dr. Morrow was unable to be present, owing to illness, and Rev. Mr. Baxter had another engagement in Georgetown.

Hymns were sung, Psalm 90 was the responsive reading, and the twenty-first chapter of Revelation, the scripture reading by Rev. E. Brillinger.

The address was given by Rev. Mr. Bennie. He was impressed by the service in the fact that so many children were present. It is for them that we remember. He was thinking of that

MANSLAUGHTER CASES HEARD AT MILTON COURT

John Hood, 25, of Stratford appearing at the Fall Assizes in Milton, on a charge of manslaughter, was acquitted Thursday by a Grand Jury, presided over by Justice McTague. Hood was driver of a car which collided with a truck on Highway No. 5, near Palermo, more than a year ago. William L. Smith, 28, of Stratford, a passenger with Hood at the time of the accident, was killed. Hood suffered concussion of the brain. Concealment of the truck was unproved.

Corporal George E. Roberts, of Stanley Barracks, Toronto, appearing at the same court, was acquitted on a charge of manslaughter, but the jury disagreed on criminal negligence charge. On the criminal negligence charge, the case will be held over until the next assizes, subject to the decision of the Crown Attorney. Roberts, riding with four troopers from the barracks, collided with a car, driven by Clarence Root, on April 30th last. Charles Root, a passenger with his father at the time of the accident, was instantly killed.

FARM BARN BURNED TO GROUND ON SUNDAY EVENING

On Sunday evening the barn on the farm of David Manner, at Crevaux Corners, was completely destroyed by fire. The blaze was first noticed by neighbors, about 7:45, and had gained considerable headway by this time. Just how the fire started is not known. Mr. Manner had been away from home since the morning, and had not returned.

There was no stock in the building, except a few chickens. The season's hay and straw were in the building and burned but the grain crop had been sold at threshing time. The building was of good size and while not of recent construction, was in fair condition. The house on the farm was burned a couple of years ago, and had been rebuilt by Mr. Manner. He was, however, not living in the house at present, but at the Corners.

The farm is just off Highway No. 7, and the blaze attracted quite a crowd of motorists, and the entire neighborhood. It could be seen for miles through the countryside and cars were lined on both sides of the road leading to the farm.

The matter of borrowings from the bank were discussed and the Clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law for borrowing an additional \$10,000 to be used if required. Council went at a loss to understand the need of by-law and will ask an explanation of the procedure, said to be necessary.

Citizens requested that an additional street light be placed on Cameron Street. The matter was left for consideration, after viewing the street.

Council expressed regret at the continued illness of Councillor McMillan, and the hope that he would soon be restored to good health.
