

Fatal Shooting Accident at Rockwood

Howard Kellington Dies of Head Wounds, in Guelph Hospital

While hading wood in the bush of Charles H Harris, at Rockwood, on Monday afternoon, Howard Kellington, aged 21, was accidentally shot in the head, and dited an hour later in Guelph General Hospital It is believed that the ahot was fired by Charles Shultis, aged 17, who was hunting with Edwin Watson, of Rockwood The shot was thought to have been aimed at a rabbit, which ran across the foot of a hill near the ton of which the unfortunate young man was loading wood on a sleigh

The accident occured about 3-45, and Kellington was found by the two young men, and rushed to the hospital, where he died an hour later
