HOUSEHOLD CONTROL OF COCKROACH PEST. Heated houses, particularly poorly constructed buildings in which loose-fitting woodwork and cracks and crevices abound, are liable to infestation by cockroaches and other household insects all the year round.

Cockroaches may be readily controlled by means of sodium fluoride which may be obtained from any druggist. The fluoride should be dusted in places frequented by the roaches, such as stinks, baseboards, cupboards and hot water pipes.

Fighting the Great Enemy with Knowledge—A Campaign to Wipe Out Ignorance, Fear and Neglect.

CANCER FROM X-RAYS. X-ray cancer of the skin never appears as such in the beginning. There is always a long period of radiodermatitis, that is a chronic inflammation of the skin, preceding the development of this type of cancer.

Sometimes this type of cancer appears following the use of the rays in the removal of hairs on the face of women. Dr. Simone Laborde, the radiologist at the celebrated cancer institute in Ville Juste Hospital in the banlieue of Paris, tells of a case of this kind, in a woman who was treated for hypertrichosis.

In the use of X-rays for such a purpose, the first thing necessary is a competent operator. If accidents of the kind of that referred to are to be avoided, the X-ray operator must have a reasonable knowledge of the dangerous agent he is employing.

ESKIMOS READ AND WRITE SYLLABIC CHARACTERS

Included in the varied cargo taken North aboard the R.M.S. Nascope by this year's Eastern Arctic Patrol were 4,000 sets of the syllabium to be distributed to the Eskimos at every port of call.

Catholic Bishops of Hudson Bay. Originally designed for the Cree Indians, the syllabium makes use of some sixty phonetic characters, and it has been found simpler to form Eskimo words by the use of these characters than by the English alphabet.
