## CANADA'S MAPLE PRODUCTS

"Saps running," and in an area extending from Western Ontario down to the Atlantic seaboard in Nova Scotia approximately 50,000 Canadian farmers are harvesting their annual spring crop of maple products. Most of the maple trees tapped are located on farmers' woodlots, and the sap they yield provides a welcome source of revenue at a time when there is little other activity on the farm.

## CANADA'S MAPLE PRODUCTS

Most of the maple syrup and maple sugar produced in Canada comes from the Province of Quebec, which accounts for about 78 per cent. of the marketed output. Ontario accounts for about 20 per cent., and New Brunswick and Nova Scotia produce the remainder.
