ELK ISLAND NATIONAL PARK

Motorists visiting Elk Island National Park in Alberta are afforded the interesting and unique experience of seeing herds of buffalo in their natural state along the roadways of the park. Bands of elk may also be seen and occasional moose browsing the tender undergrowth in the bottom lands along watercourses and lake shores. Unusual opportunities await the wild life student and camera enthusiast, as it is often possible to get within very close range of these animals. Elk Island National Park has the distinction of being the first big game sanctuary established by the Canadian Government, and is the second largest fenced animal preserve in the Dominion. It was set aside in 1906, to provide sanctuary for elk, moose and mule deer in the region, and was later used as a temporary home for the Pablo herd of buffalo purchased by the Canadian Government in 1907 until Buffalo National Park, near Wainwright, Alberta, was made ready for their reception. When the buffalo were transferred to the new Buffalo Park forty-five of their number were left in Elk Island Park to form the nucleus of an additional herd, and during the twenty-nine years that have elapsed the buffalo have steadily increased, under careful supervision, until to-day more than 2,400 of these magnificent animals roam in the park along with more than 900 moose, 200 elk and 250 wild deer. The park also forms a home for smaller animals, including the weasel, muskrat, porcupine, rabbit and squirrel. Bird life is numerous, and migratory waterfowl, which find rest and shelter on the lakes of the park, include Canada goose, duck, snipe and plover. There are several rookeries of great blue heron on Astotin Lake.

In addition to its appeal as an animal preserve, Elk Island National Park possesses facilities for outdoor life and recreation. Excellent bathing is available at Sandy Beach on Astotin Lake, where modern bathhouses have been constructed for public use, and boats and canoes may be rented at moderate rates. Close by is a nine-hole golf course, maintained by park authorities, with an attractive club house overlooking the lake. Camp and picnic grounds equipped with stoves, shelters and tables are available for visitors. Situated on Provincial Highway No. 15, about thirty miles east of Edmonton, Elk Island National Park has become a most popular summer resort and vacation area.

TRUE TEMPERANCE

The temperance of the liquor trade to appropriate the word "temperance" will not go down.  
 The word "temperance" or "temperate" includes moderate action in a great variety of applications. But if one looks at any modern dictionary he will find that the word includes abstinence, and even the movement for legal restriction of alcoholic liquors in various forms.  
 Apparently even in ancient days it covered much more than moderation and intelligent men frankly recognized that fact. Cicero, the Roman, who lived from 106 to 43 B.C., defined temperance in these words:  
 "Temperance is the unyielding control of reason over lust, and over all wrong tendencies of the mind. It means abstinence from all things not good and entirely innocent in their character."  
 And Xenophon, the Greek general, who lived about 500 B.C., says:  
 "Temperance means, first, moderation in healthful indulgence, and secondly, abstinence from things dangerous, as the use of intoxicating wine."  
 The attempt to confine "temperance" to moderation is true neither to ancient thought nor to modern fact. It is just another of those half-truths resorted to by the trade to cover a very substantial lie.

INCREASE IN HYDRO LOAD SHOWN OVER LAST MARCH

An increase of 3.8 per cent, in the primary load of the various systems of Hydro was registered for March of this year over March, 1937, according to an official bulletin issued from the office of the Provincial Power Commission.  
 Northern Ontario properties showed a 2.7 per cent. increase; the Niagara system, an increase of 1.5 per cent. rise; and the Georgian Bay system, a rise of 8.1 per cent. The Thunder Bay system was down 4.2 per cent.  
 The total of all the systems was 1,333,928 horsepower. In March of last year, it was 1,284,501.

ACCIDENTS AND COMPENSATION

During the month of March, there were 5,075 accidents reported to The Workmen's Compensation Board, as compared with 4,937 during February, and 5,309 during March a year ago.  
 The benefits awarded amounted to \$627,469.81, \$507,132.24 of which was for compensation and \$120,337.57 for medical aid.  
 This brings the number of accidents reported during the first quarter of 1938 to 15,408, being 408 more than the number for the same period of 1937, and the benefits awarded during the first three months this year amounted to \$1,862,720.11, as compared with \$1,568,796.87 during the corresponding period of 1937.
