WEED CONTROL AND CULTIVATION OF VEGETABLES

With proper cultivation throughout the season there should be little or no trouble in controlling weeds in the vegetable garden. It is said that one year's seedling means seven years' weeding.

About ten days later, when the plants show up well in the row, the Dutch hoe should be used, pushing it ahead close to the row, just skimming the plants.

The horse cultivator should be used between the rows as soon as the weeds are showing. Fairly deep cultivation at this time may be done but later all cultivation must be shallow so that the roots of the plants will not be disturbed.

Hand weeding will be necessary for some kinds of vegetables. This should be done early before the weeds become well established.

Where couch grass is troublesome in a garden it can be got rid of by "keeping it on the move," not allowing any green grass to appear.

REGENERATION OF THE FORESTS

Certain hardwoods have a tendency to crowd out commercially valuable softwoods in mixed forests according to the recently issued "Review of Reports of Growth and Regeneration Surveys in Canada," by J. H. Sandy, Dominion Forest Service of the Lands, Parks and Forests Branch, Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa.

This informative publication reviews 58 reports made since 1918 by the former Commission of Conservation and the Dominion Forest Service, and, based on analyses of past results, makes recommendations for the improvement of methods to be used in future surveys.
