NEW RAINBOW TROUT WATERS ARE OPENED

tish Columbia and one in Alberta, but within a few miles of each other, will be opened for rambow trout fishing this year. The first of these is Kinney Lake, British Columbia, on the west side of Mount Robson, and the second is Lake Adolphus, Afberta, on the north side of the same mountain and only a few yards across the provincial boundry line.

Until these two lakes were stocked with the Kamloops variety of Rainbow trout a few years ago, they were barren waters. But the planting was generous and the development of the young fish far exceeded expectations. The result is that the lakes will be opened this year for fishing and Rainbows exceeding three pounds in weight are guaranteed

Kinney Lake is the larger of the two waters It is about two miles king and is fed by numerous streams that cascade from glacial and alpine lake areas into the famous Valley of A Thousand Falls. Its outlet is the Orand Forks River, a tributary of the upper Frager. Since no attempt is being made to hold the fish to the lake waters, the incoming streams and the Grank Forks will provide excellent fast water fishing.

Lake Adolphus is situated at an altitude of about 7,500 feet on the north side of Mount Robson, within sight of one of the largest glaciers in Canada. It is almost circular in shape and because it does not draw much water from nearby glaciers, it is somewhat warmer than most alpine tarns, but considerably colder, of course, than average eastern having regard only to the claims of lake water. The outlet of this lake leads to the Smoky, which eventually reaches the Arctic by way of the Peace and Mac-

kenzie Rivers. Because of their altitude these lakes will provide their best fishing from the middle of July to the middle of Septem-

importance, but still no action has been taken. No other expenditure you could make could be so fully justified. Immediate benefits would result from the constant systematic inspection of the physical health conditions of the pupils. Experience throughout the Province has proved that such a service to youth is of inestimable benefit. I content myself with referring you to my previous reports in this connection.

I do not propose at this time to offer any remarks on the problems of education generally. At some length in my last report I called your attention to some of these and if you are sufficiently interested I suggest

that you refer again to that report. The enrollment of the school is 267. It may be interesting to point out that twenty-five years ago it was 280, with six rooms. The exhibit of Benior Art this year, under the direction of Miss Young, is exceptionally good, conforming very fully to the new topics in this subject in the new Course of Study. I feel like specfally commending also the efforts of two of your experienced teachers. Misses Polster and MacMillan, in proceeding towards the necessary higher qualifications for permanent Pirst Class Certificates. Miss Orr has I believe, the same purpose in

mind. The new Course of Study for Grades I-VI., has been received by the teachers with general favor. This the former prescription of work, not so much in content, but rather in organization and method. The new Course is based more specifically on the immediate needs and capacities of the child at different stages and is intended to place chief emphasis upon the activities of the child rather than the instructional function of the teacher. The flexibility of the curriculum has already made possible such an adaptation to the needs of individual pupils as to show that the new Course will be of much more general profit than a Course that is less elastic in its requirements. shall be very pleased to receive from you any criticism, favorable or unfavorable, that you desire to offer of the Course as far as you have become acquainted with it in your school

In conclusion, I bespeak for my successor in office your support and co-operation. I venture to suggest that you invite him to meet you personally occasionally. In such close conference and exchange of ideas you may find mutual benefit in the administration of the affairs of your school. As for myself, I lay down my responsibility with a sense of having sought at least to be of some assistance to your teachers and to present to you the needs of the school, and suggest ways in which you might best serve its highest interests. You have my very best wishes for ever increasing success and prosperity.
