Anticipation may often be better than realization so far as adults are concerned, but "realization" is the thing with Christmas, pientes or birth-·day parties reach their senith when they arrive-not before.

But even with children, anticipation should be considered. Mysterious packcards, or a preview of attractive decorated desserts bring joy to a child's heart and a smile of rapture to his face.

Prepare your child's birthday menu as carefully as you prepare your bridge party luncheon. Use frills galore, but keep the foods simple, healthful and light. Serve the meal at the regular time. For dessert, use something like a light rennet-custard. It requires no eggs. no boiling and no baking, may be prepared in advance, and may be decorated so that it will bring shouts of pleasure from their homes.

Here is a suggested child's birthday menu, also a recipe for the dessert:
