#### Georgetown

One of our citizens poked his car against a telephone pole on Factory Street one day last week, and the pole broke in the centre and hung suspended from the cable. The pole has been replaced.

The amount received by the Town of Georgetown from the Liquor Control Board as its share of the profit from the sale of liquor sold in this municipality in 1937 was \$230.94, or 34 cents more than the previous year.

The cost of relief in Georgetown has been gradually growing less for some time and to-day was informed by Mayor Gibbons, who has charge of that department, that there is not one employable person in town now on relief. The cost of relief in May, 1938, was \$170.05, or \$25.82 less than May, 1937. For the first five months of 1938, ending May 10th, the cost of relief in Georgetown, has been \$2,490.70 less than the five corresponding months of 1937.

Dr. C. V. Williams, M.O.H., addressed Council in regard to installation of a sewage system in Georgetown. He introduced Dr. A. E. Berry, of the Provincial Department of Health, who went more fully into the matter. He emphasized the need of such a system in Georgetown, owing to the unsanitary condition in certain parts of the town.

### County Offers Reward for the Escaped Prisoner

Moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mr. Byers, that the Reeves of the several municipalities be a committee on equalization and that Council adjourn, to await their report.—Carried.

The committee brought in a recommendation that the assessment be the same as last year.

Moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mr. Byers, that the report of the committee be adopted.—Carried.

Council went into Committee of the Whole, to consider the reports of the standing committees. MR. GORDON took the chair.

Moved by Mr. Irving, seconded by Mr. Byers, that the following accounts be paid:

Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. McCutcheon, that a grant of \$175 be given to the Fall Fair Boards of Acton, Milton and Georgetown, and that a grant of \$125 be given to the Mould Board Association.

Mr. Hall asked why the grant recommended had been raised. Mr. Wilson explained the Society was put to considerable expense in connection with the Fall Fair.

Mr. Hall thought it would be better if the Society tried to increase membership rather than an increased grant. "Although," said Mr. Hall, "I am not opposed to a grant, but I thought we did well to double it last year."

Mr. Robinson—I think the money is well spent. If we spend thousands of dollars on County Roads, why can't we give \$175 to our local fairs." The motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Kerns, seconded by Mr. Allen, that a reward of \$100 be paid by the County of Halton for the arrest and conviction or for information resulting in the arrest and conviction of W. M. Moore, who broke out and escaped from Halton County Jail on June 6th, 1938. In the event of more than one person claiming a share in the said award, it shall be apportioned in such manner as the Warden of the County deems just and in all matters of dispute his decision shall be final. No salaries official of the County shall be eligible for this award.—Carried.

Because of the difficulty in dealing with chicken thieves, it was moved by Mr. Gordon, seconded by Mr. Gilbert, that the law be so amended that anyone caught with the tools in his possession that are commonly used in stealing fowl, that he be dealt with the same as if caught with burglar tools in his possession.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kerns, seconded by Mr. Davis, that this Council do strongly recommend the re-appointment of Mr. Frank McKeown as jailor of Halton County Jail at Milton, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Attorney General.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kerns, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that this Council make a donation of \$15.00 to the Agricultural Council of Ontario.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hall, seconded by Mr. McEwen, that this be instruction to the Warden and Clerk to sign a by-law for the appointment of solicitors to defend the action pending against the County of Halton.—Carried.

The action referred to is that in which John Edward Marshall is plaintiff and the Municipal Corporation of the County of Halton is defendant.

By-law No. 716, to equalize the assessment, and No. 717, to engage solicitors, were given three readings and passed.

In regard to an increase in the salary of the County Engineer, it was left to the Road Committee to bring in a recommendation at the next meeting.

Arrangements were made for the annual fishing trip for members of the Council, to take place on July 20th, following a meeting of the Council on the 19th.

Council adjourned.
