Here bre short cut recipes for luscious fruit cream pies that will work like magic as compliment winners. These fillings made with sweetened condensed milk. need no cooking at all. Even the bride who can "scarcely boil water" can make them to perfection if she uses this maric milk because these recipes are guaranteed failure proof: Use a crumb crust that needs no baking and your ble triumph will be ready to chill in the refrigerator in less than ten minutes.

MAGIO PEACH MERINGUE PIE 11/4 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed

- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 eggs, separated 1 oup sliced peaches
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Chocolate Wafer Pie Crust

Blend together sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice and egg yolks. Fold in sliced peaches. Pour into 9-inch plate lined with Chocolate Wafer Pie Orust. Cover with meringue made by besting our whites until stiff and adding sawar. Bake in moderate oven degrees P.) 10 minutes or until brown.

If you have a favorite apple tree watch it carefully for signs of the presence apple borers Shallow, irregular mines or burrows just under the bark of the trunk or main branches indicate The by Mrs. Jeanne NucEvoy, on the sands presence of this flat-headed pest. burrows are usually on the sunny side of

the tree, but may encircle it. Orubs, found in the burrows during the winter and early spring, are about one and one-fourth inches in length This garden-graph shows what this grub looks like It is yellowish in color, with a broad, flat enlargement of a body segment just in back of the head.

Once a tree is infected, the only remedy ir to remove the grubs by digging with and not against it.


