PIES BRIDES CAN BAKE

A good dinner turneth away wrath, as every woman knows. When the man of the house seems out of sorts, an appetizing meal is better than a soft answer in restoring domestic harmony, and a tempting dessert is the most effective strategy of all.

LEMON PEACH MERINGUE PIE

- 1 1/2 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk 2 tablespoons lemon juice 2 eggs, separated 1 cup sliced peaches 2 tablespoons granulated sugar Chocolate Wafer Pie Crust

Blend together sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice and egg yolks. Fold in sliced peaches. Pour into 9-inch pie plate lined with Chocolate Wafer Pie Crust. Cover with meringue made by beating egg whites until stiff and adding sugar. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 10 minutes or until brown. Chill before serving.

CHOCOLATE WAFER PIE CRUST

Roll enough chocolate wafers to make 1/4 cup of crumbs. Cut enough chocolate wafers into halves to stand around edge of pie plate. Cover bottom of plate with crumbs and fill in spaces between wafers. Four in filling as usual.

MAKING RASPBERRY CREAM PIE

- 1 1/2 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk 1/4 cup lemon juice 1 cup raspberries 1/2 cup whipping cream 2 tablespoons confectioners' (4X) sugar

Blend sweetened condensed milk and lemon juice. Stir until mixture thickens. Fold in raspberries. Pour into pie plate (9-inch) lined with Baked Pie Shell or Crumb Crust. Cover with whipped cream sweetened with confectioners' sugar. Chill before serving. Black raspberries may be used.

DOMINION GOVERNMENT ATTACKS HOUSING PROBLEM

Success of Burlington Experiment Recognized and Put into Practice Dominion-wide by New Legislation

The Dominion Government has brought down a three-way housing scheme designed as a frontal attack on the housing question in this country. It is a well recognized fact that the construction trades are lagging far behind the general business recovery which is taking place across Canada.

In introducing this housing legislation recently the Minister of Finance gave credit to Mr. Hughes Cleaver, M.P., our Federal Member, for sponsoring the scheme, which is based on the Burlington experiment. The Town of Burlington in 1933 made arrangements to try an experiment in regard to assistance to home building, which has turned out to be extremely successful and it is as a result of this experiment that the provision of part three of the Housing Act are now to be put into effect throughout Canada.
