The second accident, in which Robert Currie Wilson, aged 38, of Kitchener, lost his life, occurred about 6.30 on Saturday evening. Four other persons were injured in this collision.

Wilson had been attending the Porsyth picnic at Edgewood Park, at Eden Mills, and was returning to Kitchener, It would appear that he did not realize he was so close to the highway at the junction of the gravel road and highway, about three miles west of Rockwood, Indications PIANO RECITAL are that the brake was applied but the car hurtled onto the highway, crashing into the side of a car, driven by Ernest The impact threw both machines over.
