
One milk product may seem very different to another and entirely different yet may be quite similar from a nutritive standpoint.

Neither evaporated milk nor whole milk powder resemble fresh, field milk, yet they contain the same solid materials—the two proteins. cessin and lactablumen, milk sugar, butter fat, minerals, principally calcium and phosphorus and, in addition, vitamins. When reconstituted to fluid milk by the addition of the required amount of water, these milk products are equivalent to fresh milk in food value, and may be satisfactorily substituted for it. content. Skim-milk powder, lacking fat, is similar to fresh skim-milk, when reconstituted by the addition of the necessary amount of water. Even buttermil's with its thickened, clabbered appearance, seems unlike fresh sweet milk, and yet both have practially the same food value, except that buttermilk is usually made from partially skim-milk, and has

a lower fat content than whole milk. Cheese is even a more striking exhand, and similarity on the other. Practically all Canadian cheddar cheese is mains in the cheese. Cheese also retains practically all of the original fat of milk which contains essential vitamins.

From the government standards concentrated milk and cheese, it has been calculated that 18% ounces of evaporated milk is closely equivalent in food value to one quart of whole milk.
