WHAT AFFECTS GRAIN TRADE

World production of wheat, exclusive of Russia and China, during the 1937-38 season showed an increase over the previous year and was little less than in 1933-34. Variations in total production, however, states the Imperial Economic Committee, affect the grain trade less than changes in certain countries. Thus, the upward trend in Russian production has had only an occasional influence.

More important in their effects in the years preceding 1937-38 were (1) the lower level of output in Canada, the United States, and Australia from 1933 to 1936, (2) the exceptionally small Argentine crop in 1935-36, and (3) the fall in production in France, Italy and Germany in 1937.
