St. Joseph's Church 80th Anniversary Splendid Success

Services Held on Sunday, Monday
and Tuesday — Bishop of
Hamilton Addressed
Congregation

On Sunday last the congregation of St. Joseph's Church began the triduum of Thanksgiving in commemoration of the 80th foundation of the first Catholic Church in the district. The interior and the exterior of the church was decorated for the occasion. His Excellency the Bishop of Hamilton, the Most Rev. J. F. Ryan, J.C.D., preceded by the Legionaries, who acted as a guard of honor to His Excellency, the Confirmation Class and Altar Boys marched from the Rectory to the church. At the church he was met by the pastor, Rev. Father McBride. His Excellency said Mass for all the dead and living of the parish.

Rev. Father Monaghan, S.J., of Guelph, and Rev. Dr. J. O'Reilly, of Guelph, acted as Chaplains to the Bishop. Rev. Father A. O'Brien, of Hamilton, was Master of Ceremonies assisted by Rev. Dr. P. O'Brien, of Guelph.

After Mass, the pastor extended a hearty welcome, in the name of the parish of Acton and Georgetown. He related a short history of the parish from the beginning. He told His Excellency that the parish would pray that God may spare him to them for many years and bless his every undertaking for the glory of God and His church. His Excellency in eloquent terms, which deeply touched the hearts of the people, congratulated them on their 80th jubilee and the work which they had done. He warned them against the tares in the world to-day and to make their homes real Christian ones—homes where the little ones will know and love God through their parents. He then administered the sacrament of Confirmation to a class of 38, 34 children and four adults. For this occasion the church was filled to capacity, many being unable to enter. In the hall, after the service, the Bishop personally spoke to all the people. The men and women of Acton and Georgetown gave him a spiritual offering. Miss Delaine Gibson, a great-great-granddaughter of one of the first settlers, gave a beautiful basket of mums from the children of the parish.

At 3:30 p.m. there was a large gathering at the cemetery in the district of Dublin. His Excellency assisted by the Right Rev. Monsignor McCann, of Toronto, a former resident of Georgetown; Rev. Father Kelly, formerly of Acton, now pastor at Meriton; Rev. Dr. P. O'Brien; Dr. J. O'Reilly, and Father Monaghan, S.J., of Guelph, and Rev. Father Kehoe of Rockwood, and Rev. Father McBride, the pastor, blessed a cross erected on the site of the first church built to the memory of the first churchmen. A very instructive sermon on the church's foundation and its necessity was given by Rev. Dr. P. O'Brien.

On the beautiful altar erected by the men of the parish, benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given by the Bishop, with Father Monaghan, S.J., and Father Kelly acting as deacon and subdeacon.

On Monday Masses were at 8:00 and 9:00 a.m. Everyone in the congregation received Holy Communion at these masses, for all the deceased of the parish and their relatives. Rev. Father Kehoe of Rockwood said Mass at 8:00 and the pastor sang a Requiem High Mass at 9:00.

From 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. a delicious supper was served by the ladies of the parish. The hall was decorated for this occasion and there were many happy reunions. The Mayor of Georgetown, J. Glasson, extended words of thanks from the old boys of the parish to the pastor and the former pastors.

At 7:30 p.m. devotions were held in the church. Rev. Father J. Trainer gave a very patriotic and touching sermon on the graces obtained from the church.

Barn Near Eden Mills Burned Saturday Night

One of the largest barns in this district, that owned by the Moses Gervais, Eden Mills address, just off No. 7 Highway, west of Rockwood, was burned to the ground in a spectacular fire on Saturday night. The entire season's crop was destroyed in the blaze, but there was no stock lost. Spontaneous combustion is blamed for the outbreak.

A motorist proceeding along the road noticed the flames, and notified the owners. Neighbors formed a bucket brigade, and while it was impossible to save the barn, they prevented the flames from spreading to the house, towards which the wind was blowing the flames in a direct line. Only constant hard work over a long period saved the house from destruction.



The Mill Street Pavement Being Completed

Work commenced this morning on finishing the Mill Street pavement started just a year ago. C. C. Cornell of Brantford, contractor, has begun laying the surface on the section between Wilbur Street to John St. etc, three blocks.

The short block, from Wilbur Street, to the railway tracks and the business blocks, from John to Main Streets, are not included in the present work appropriation. The road surface is being built up with a composition similar to level the road up to the grade just below the curbs. The top surface is known as "non-skid" pavement and the material is manufactured in Dundas and brought here by truck.

The work of constructing the pavement will not interfere any with traffic on the street. A steam roller used on the work, was unloaded at the C.N.R. tracks during the week.

The completion of this work will be greatly appreciated by citizens generally, as the pavement in these sections has lacked drainage and been a source of trouble and annoyance for years. The levels were such that the water could not reach the catch basins properly and water was always lying on the road surface. It is to be hoped the completion of the whole street, with a proper surface, may soon be undertaken.
