terest accruing from the Highway Fund among the different School Sections entitled thereto, was read as required and passed, and the seal of the Corporation was attached.

By-law No. 900, to access the several School Sections and Union School Sections of the Township of Esqueging for the year 1938 was read as required and passed.

By-law No. 901, to assess the Township of Esqueging for the year 1938, was also read and sanctioned.

By-law No. 902, to empower the Collector of Rates to collect statutory penalties for non-payment of taxes after December 31st, 1938 was also passed, after being read as required.

By-law No. 903, to grant permission to the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow money to meet the current expenditure of the Township, received the required readings and the blanks were filed in with the sum of three thousand dollars, and the by-law approved.

Moved by W. A. Wilson, seconded by E. Harrop, that this Council do now adjourn, to meet on Monday, October 10th, 1938, at 1:30 o'clock, or at the call of the Reeve. Carried.
