We hear a great deal of criticism of the church from all sorts of people, and while it is true that it is the easiest thing in the world to criticize, requiring neither brains nor knowledge, we do well to listen to it and we need never fear it. We have nothing to fear from the spirit of ignorance among our own members. We need a better understanding of what the Church is. We are here not to coddle our souls but to sell the idea of Christian chumchmanip to a non-chumchmined world and to that end we must be people who believe in Him whom we profess to believe.
