## Mason Knitting Co. Buys Larger Building in Acton (Continued from Page One)

Gurlph Street. Placing of equipment will be in such a manner that the goods process of manufacture will travel along a direct floor line until they are ready for shipment or storage. The buildings are ideally situated and arranged for the manufacturing of the Mason Co. It is, we understand, the plan to make the necessary changes now and have the premises ready for occupancy in the between-season period, in late December and January.

The growth of the Mason Knitting Company in Acton has indeed been creditable Just sixteen years ago Mr. A. Mason established the industry in what had formerly been the municipal power station. There were then six emplayers. The one story original building now has three floors and an addition is fully twice the size with two floors. Between fifty and sixty employees are now regularly engaged here. Mr. Mason has had a life-time experience in the textile business, and for the past five years his son, Mr. George Mason, has been actively associated in the business

Citizens generally are pleased at the expansion of the industry, especially since Acton is the home town, where Amos Mason and his son, George spent their boyhood days, and they have always had a practical and helpful interest in the betterment of the community. It is also interesting to all to know that the present factory of the Mason Kniting Company will be kept available for securing an industry to occupy it. Mr. Mason has expressed a willingness to make reasonable arrangements for any new industry whose needs would require this type of building.

By this process, small particles of glass will be blown onto the numerals until they are completely coated.
