GRANTS OF LAND TO C.P. EXCEEDS 26,000,000 ACRES
Railways of Canada have received grants from Dominion and Provincial Governments a total of 47,839,800 acres of land. Land grants to the Canadian Pacific and acquired companies have been 26,109,643 acres from the Dominion and 18,447,291 acres from Provincial Governments.
The Canadian National received 5,762,741 acres from the Dominion Government and 1,841,061 acres from Provincial Governments, or a total of 7,603,802 acres.
Other railways in Canada have received 8,859 acres from the Dominion Government and 3,089,871 acres from Provincial Governments.
Total Dominion grants have been 31,881,643 acres and Provincial grants have been 15,758,223 acres.
