Lloyd Mack, of Rockwood with his senior yearling heifer, "Maple Grove Witch," carried off the grand champion female in the Aberdeen-Angus group. Edwards Brothers, of Watford, had the grand champion bull in this class.

"Watch Me," a young steer exhibited by Wm. J. Kay, of Guelph, easily won the grand championship in the Market Cattle division and "Good Enough" from the same stable, was good enough to take the reserve championship.

O'Neil Brothers, of Denfield, had the champion Hereford female in "Lady Armour," with F. W. Reichel taking the reserve female award. The order was reversed in the male group, however, when Reichel took the grand championship with his bull, and O'Neil Bros. secured the reserve championship ribbon.

In the Shorthorn group, "Gay Lass," exhibited by John Guardhouse and Sons, of Weston was adjudged the grand champion female, and Brawth Monarch, from the stable of J. Douglas and Son Caledonia was grand champion bull.

Mentioned for Chief Justice's Appointment



MR. JUSTICE H. F. ROSE R. S. ROBERTSON, K.C. Following the resignation of Hon. Newton Rowell as Chief Justice of Ontario, two names have been mentioned as his probable successor. Mr. Justice Rose, whose name was mentioned for the chief justice's post shortly before the appointment of Mr. Rowell two years ago, is again mentioned as a possible successor to Mr. Rowell. R. S. Robertson, K.C., of Toronto regarded as one of the most eminent legal authorities in the Dominion, has also been mentioned for the post. He represented the Canadian government when Prime Minister Mackenzie King submitted the Bennett "Reform Bill" to the Privy Council two years ago.
