## O.H.A. Groupings Are Announced For the Season

### Acton Junior and Intermediate Teams Both in Six Team Groups.

Interest in hockey this week centres on the O.H.A. groupings announced over the weekend. Acton Junior Team will play in Group 6, with Milton, Orillia, Orangeville, Fergus and Elora. The Intermediates are back again in "B" class and this year are placed in Group 5, which comprises Acton, Elora, Fergus, Guelph, Preston and Guelph. The towns in both groups are very conveniently situated and local officials and fans are quite satisfied with the arrangement. It will be noted that the Intermediates have a rather heavy assignment. Elora were champions of B class last year; and Preston's champions of A class. All are in the one group.

The Juniors are likewise in a heavy group, as Orangeville were last year's Junior C champions.

At the close of the meeting, W. Bro. Dr. J. A. McNiven gave a very interesting and instructive address on "The Perfect Ashlar." He showed how we should try to mould our character to conform with the perfect ashlar.

In this brief resume it would be impossible to list all the awards won by exhibitors from the County, but the following cross section will indicate the prominence of Halton exhibitors and also the diversification of Halton agriculture. The winning of a grand championship at any show is a real achievement, but to win such an award at the Chicago International is one which is most gratifying to all Canadians, no matter in what province or country they may reside, and therefore the Grand Championship won by Campbell's Command, owned and exhibited by Grant Campbell of Moffat, is indeed worthy of special mention. The Berkshire Female Championship at the Royal was won by a sow owned and exhibited by Rae Scott, of Acton. Other livestock winners at the Royal included Hugh Rodney, Milton, with Percherons, Valley Crest Farms, Palermo, with Clydesdales, Saddle Horses and Guernseys. Dr. Cecil Head, Milton, with Standard Breeds, Gru. H. King, Oakville with Gloucesters, Mark Given & Son, Limhouse, N. G. Lindsay and Bent Kerr & Son, of Acton, with Hackneys, W. O. and T. J. Brownridge, Georgetown, with Berkshires and Tamworths, and Oscar Lerch, Georgetown, with Yorkshires.

Many of these exhibitors were also prominent winners at the Provincial Winter Fair Guelph, and in addition we noted the well known sheep flocks of F. C. Wilmett & Son, and J. E. McKinney, both of Milton.

The Agricultural Society class at Guelph brought out 15 entries, with Esquiring Society in second and the Acton Society in 7th place. Prominent among the winners in the Seed Division at both the Royal and Guelph were T. J. Brownridge, Jim Cunningham, Bruce Brigdon, F. Wilson, all of Georgetown, J. H. McLean, Milton, John Vanekie, Putrino, Woodlands Orchards, Bronte, S. E. Griffin & Son and Hugh Reid of Acton. In the section open to members of Boys' Gran Club, Wm. Bradley, Horace Reid, Goo and Allan Simpson, Campbellville, were 4th, 5th and 6th respectively, in the early odd class, while in late odd Geo. Plante, Georgetown was 4th, Ward Brownridge, Georgetown, 5th, Chas. Barber, Acton, 7th, and Smith Griffin, of Acton was 8th. In the Inter-Girls Club Judging Competition, which brought out 18 teams, the Acton team, composed of Jack vanGoolen and James McNabb was third, and the Georgetown team, of Joe Milton and Robt Alexander was fifth.

At the Royal Winter Fair, the Inter County Judging Competition for the Jeffery Bull Memorial Trophy brought out 30 teams, from as many different counties. Here the Halton team of Gerald Graham, Georgetown, Richard McLaughlin, Norval, and Walter Reid, Milton placed twelfth, with Gerald Graham placing tenth out of the ninety competitors.

To all Halton exhibitors we extend our hearty congratulations for the honors brought back to the County.
