Another Midnight Session As 1939 Council Continues

Ask Loosening of Building Restrictions—Fire Brigade Urges New Pumper—Other Appointments Are Made and Problems Are Discussed.

The fortnightly session of Acton Council was held on Tuesday evening, with Councillors A. Mason, J. Chalmers, E. Jones and W. J. Beatty present, and Reeve F. J. McCutcheon presiding. On this occasion the Reeve welcomed Councillor Beatty to his seat at the Council table and the newly-elected Councillor expressed the hope that during the year he would be helpful, but pointed out that this was his first venture in municipal work.

Mr. S. Mackenzie interviewed the Council regarding a building permit for remodeling the building owned by Mr. T. Morton, on Mill Street, recently destroyed by fire. It was proposed to erect a one-story building, set on posts, and covered with imitation brick siding. The by-law for Mill Street called for a brick, stone or concrete construction.

Council, upon motion, accepted the specifications and details and agreed to give the matter consideration as soon as possible.

Chief R. M. McDonald and members of the Fire Brigade were present and addressed the Council, requesting the consideration of the Council in purchasing a fire pumper for the brigade, replacing the present fire truck and obviating the necessity of putting pressure on the whole system. Costs of this equipment was from \$2,500 to \$4,000, according to the machine purchased. The Council acknowledged the necessity of the equipment, but deferred action until a meeting when the whole matter could be considered fully, and the Brigade notified of the meeting.

Mrs. E. E. Barr and Mrs. H. Mainprize on behalf of the Duke of Devonshire Chapter of the I.O.D.E. requested the use of the Town Hall for a showing of educational pictures without charge. It was pointed out the work of the Chapter was doing in the community with funds raised. Council was agreed to grant this request and the Reeve expressed appreciation of the work the Chapter was doing.

A letter from Mr. Beatty acknowledging the Council's expression of sympathy was received. Another letter, from Mr. Jas. H. Reid, expressed willingness to serve on the Board of Health. The Ontario Municipal Association, in a letter, requested that Acton affiliate and pay the annual fee.

Council considered affiliation but desired further information as to the aims and objects of the Association and asked the Clerk to write requesting this information.

The Council were notified of the resignation of Mr. A. T. Brown from the Library Board. Mr. Brown had served on the Board for nine years, seven years of which he had been Chairman. The Clerk was instructed to write, expressing appreciation of Mr. Brown's community service. By motion, Principal M. Leitch was appointed to the vacancy by the Council.

Correspondence regarding the protection of Mill Street crossing, which will be considered by the Board of Transport Commissioners was read. The hearing was postponed until February 21st, according to a further notice received from the Board.

The matter of arena affairs and the appointment of Councillor Beatty to the Commission were discussed by the Council. No action was, however, taken.

The Reeve and Councillor Mason were appointed a committee to arrange with the Utilities Commission so that the Auditors could continue their work after the office is closed.

It was decided to hold the regular meeting of Council every other Monday, at 7:30 p.m., except where the Monday falls on a public holiday, in which case the meeting will be held on Tuesday following. During July and August only one meeting each month shall be held, namely, on July 2nd and August 14th, and on September 11th.

By motion, the Municipal Officer was empowered to employ James Mills as (Concluded on Page Eight).

Acton Loses First Group Game to Elora by 5-3

Hectic Battle with Twenty Penalties—Police Had to Interfere to Quiet the Players

On Monday night the Elora Rocks journeyed to Acton, and the Tanners were handed their first set-back of the season, in a rather weird exhibition of hockey. The game was exceedingly rough, both teams indulging in this practice unnecessarily. In the second period of the game, ten penalties were handed out—4 to Acton, 6 to Elora. The total time handed out was 29 minutes. There was a fight between players in this game, but one thing we noticed, not a spectator ventured over the boards, which seemed to us to speak volumes for the people of both towns. Elora, undoubtedly, deserved the win, as they played better hockey during the majority of the game. Though much of the encounter was of the shabby variety, and "rugged" hockey was what we would call it.

Acton secured the puck from the face-off and went in on the Elora team, only to lose the rubber to Elora. Several rushes followed by both teams. Brush for Acton getting a nice try. Woods made a stop on J. Quinn's try. The pace for the opening frame was exceedingly fast. It was apparent from the start that Elora were out to avenge the defeat handed them in the opening game of the season, when Acton defeated them 5-1 in their own back yard. At 2:15 Blinco was banished by Referee Fildore. Acton tried turning on the power, but no results followed. Just after Blinco's return, Miller got counted No. 1 for the visitors, at 4:30. A fine spirit of co-operation was exhibited throughout the meeting and the business was carried through in a happy and expeditious manner.

Appointment of a Chairman was deferred until a later meeting, when a new member had been appointed by Council. Passing of accounts and other routine business occupied the attention of the Board for the half hour session.

First Meeting of the Council in Erin Township

Appointments Made and By-Laws Passed—Chartered Accountants for Auditors

The newly elected Council of the Township of Erin is as follows: Neil E. McKinnon, Reeve, Henry Wheeler, Deputy Reeve, Wm. McKinnon, Edgar Huxley and Arthur Swickhamer, Councillors. Rev. G. W. Charlton opened the initial session with a scripture reading and prayer.

The following By-laws were passed: By-law No. 1 fixed salaries at \$300 per year and 10¢ per mile, one way for the Council Clerk, \$400, Assessor \$150, Collector, \$200, Treasurer, \$300, solicitors of Jurors, \$12.

By-law No. 2 appointed J. E. Pearen as a member of the Board of Health.
By-law No. 3 appointed the following officials: Clerk, Jas. McKinnon; Assessor, G. W. Charlton; Collector, And. J. Lindsay; Treasurer, Dan Gray.

By-law No. 4 fixed the borrowings from the Royal Bank at \$30,000 at the rate of 5% per annum.
By-law No. 5 provided the following amounts for Road expenditure, Construction, \$3,000; Bridges, \$1,000; Superintendence, \$500; Machinery, \$200; Maintenance and repair, \$9,300. Total estimate expenditure, \$14,000.

The County Treasurer was requested to return all money due Erin Township to the Township Treasurer.

Treasurer was bonded with the Canadian Surety Company for \$15,000 Premium \$60.

The Township joined the Good Roads Association, members of the Council to be declared.

The Township agreed with the Trustees of Police Village of Hillsburg to pay \$30 towards salary of Constable Constable services to be available anywhere in the Township.

The Erin Advocate were awarded the Township printing at \$300.

A resolution was passed, stating that any bank cheque in payment of taxes must be in the hands of Collector, or Royal Banks at Erin or Hillsburg, or Bank of Nova Scotia, Acton, on or before the last day of any given month, in order to be considered paid in that month; otherwise all charges will be imposed.

The Council decided to engage a Chartered Accountant auditor for 1939, and the Clerk was instructed to write different firms to submit tenders for consideration at the February 13th meeting of the Council.
