We would like to take this opportunity of, thanking you for your generous response. The attendance at our concert was far greater than we hoped.

Continuing our week by week description of the school—Room I is really the most modern equipped room in the school. It is on the lower floor, with large windows opening towards Highway No. 7. On two sides of the room stretch long blackboards, with rulers and geometric instruments specially built for demonstration. The desks are arranged in five rows, running parallel to the windows. The seats are of the modern type, being built on a swivel for added comfort. The desks are equipped with a hinged lid, which allows the student a good view of the interior. At the back of the room at each side are bulletin boards, while are done by the students is on display in the space between them. Room I or Grade IX, as it is now called, is the assembly hall of the school, and the literary meetings are held here. The piano in the west corner adds a homey touch to the room.

People showed such an interest in the marionettes, that we should like to describe them to you. The head of the doll is made of paper mache, manufactured by the students themselves. Newsprint was soaked in water and ground, then mixed with paste. The plastic material thus obtained was moulded into the head and left to dry. After the head was completely dry and hard, it was painted flesh color, and the features were added. A sawdust stuffed body and long flexible limbs were then attached. The clothes and controlling strings were added. The fist puppets were made in much the same way, and controlled by slipping the doll over the fingers.

## SECOND SUEZ CANAL?



Construction of a "second Suez canal," an alternate link in the British chain of round-the-world defences, is reported to be planned by the British Government, following the Arab-Jewish conference in Palestine in London. The route of the proposed canal, linking Haifa on the Mediterranean coast of Palestine to the Red Sea port of Akaba, is shown on the map. The proposed canal would be of great value in the event of a blockade of the Suez during a possible future war in the Mediterranean.
