Besides her husband, six daughters and one son survive, as follows: Mrs. Ernest Dage, Mrs. Thomas Hickey, and Mrs. Harold Beatty, all of Hamilton; Mrs. Hillyard Lashby and Mrs. George Fryer, of Acton; Mrs. Thomas Hatch, of Toronto; and Mrs. Frank Penson, Jr., Georgetown, who also lives to mourn her loss. Besides her family, four brothers and two sisters, all of England. The remains were interred in Hamilton cemetery, on Monday afternoon, following the service at two o'clock, at the I. G. Wallace funeral chapel.

MRS. THOMAS ELLIOT Although she has never enjoyed robust health, the passing of Mrs. Thos. Elliot last Friday was quite sudden. She had been about as usual until Wednesday, when she suffered a stroke of paralysis, from which she failed to rally and passed away early Friday. She was in her sixty-eighth year.

Mrs. Elliot was before marriage, Mary Adelaide Lashby, a daughter of the late Oliver Lashby. She was born in Acton and spent her entire life in Hamilton County. Her birthplace was the home now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Brown, on Mill Street. Following her marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Elliot resided in Nelson Township. Her husband predeceased her twenty-five years ago. In February, 1913, Mrs. Elliot and her only daughter, now Mrs. E. P. Watson, came to Acton and have resided here ever since.

Mrs. Elliot was a quiet woman, and her long period of ill health has made her unable to attend to more than the duties of the home or take an active interest outside. She was a kindly neighbor and enjoyed the esteem of all with whom she came in contact. Only one daughter remains, and for years she has given steadfast devotion to the care and comfort of a mother beloved. Three brothers, S. M. Ebsby, Acton; William Lashby, of Townsend, Montana; Oliver Lashby, of Wilmar, Minn.; and one sister, Mrs. S. J. Oram, of St. Catharines, also remain. Sympathy of many friends here goes out to the bereaved.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, with private service at the home, conducted by her minister, Rev. H. L. Bennie. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Acton. The pallbearers were Messrs.
