VILLAGE OF ACTON NOTICE

The Municipal Council of the Village of Acton will, after the expiration of one month from the date of this notice, take into consideration and pass a by-law to stop and close the following streets or highways or allowances for same, or parts thereof, in the said Village, namely:

1. That part of Elgin Street between Lot 5, Block 24, Plan 227, and Lots 5 and 4, Block 25, Plan 227, in the Village of Acton, known as that part of Elgin Street lying south of and between on Plan 227 as Toronto Suburban Railway lands, and being more particularly described as follows: Commencing at the easterly angle of Lot 5, Block 25, Plan 227, thence north 52 degrees 14 minutes west a distance of 142.9 feet, more or less, to a point; thence north 85 degrees 23 minutes east a distance of 55.9 feet to a point; thence south-east along the north-east limit of Elgin Street a distance of 117 feet, more or less, to the southerly angle of Lot 8, Block 34, Plan 227; thence south west along the south easterly limit of Elgin Street a distance of 49.5 feet to the point of commencement.

2. That part of Guelph Street as shown on Plan 227 for the Village of Acton, more particularly described as follows: Commencing at a point in the north east limit of Guelph Street distant 255.5 feet southeast of the point where the production north easterly in a straight line of the north west limit of Church Street meets the north east limit of Guelph Street; thence south west at right angles to the last mentioned line a distance of 12 feet to the north east limit of Guelph Street; thence in a straight line parallel to the north east limit of Guelph Street a distance of 144.13 feet to a point; thence in a north east direction at right angles to the last mentioned line a distance of 12 feet to the north east limit of Guelph Street; thence in a north west direction along the north east limit of Guelph Street a distance of 144.13 feet to the point of commencement.

DARK LINES SHOW WHERE TO PRUNE ROOT



Proper pruning for better roses
Proper pruning of rose roots at planting time means bigger, better blooms later on in the season. One of the objects of root pruning of roses is to stimulate rapid growth of a feeding root system. Where each root is cut a callus will form and from this spot new, fibrous roots will grow. These roots, in turn, help to supply the rose with food and thus stimulate strong, vigorous growth and good health.

The dark lines on accompanying illustration show where to trim the roots of a rose bush at planting time. Use a sharp knife to make the cuts. If shears are used, the roots are apt to be bruised and crushed in the cutting.

If the roots of a rose bush are trimmed back in this way the growth of many feeder roots will be stimulated. If the long roots are left on a rose when it is planted, only a few new feeding rootlets will be produced and the rose is apt to develop into a sickly plant.

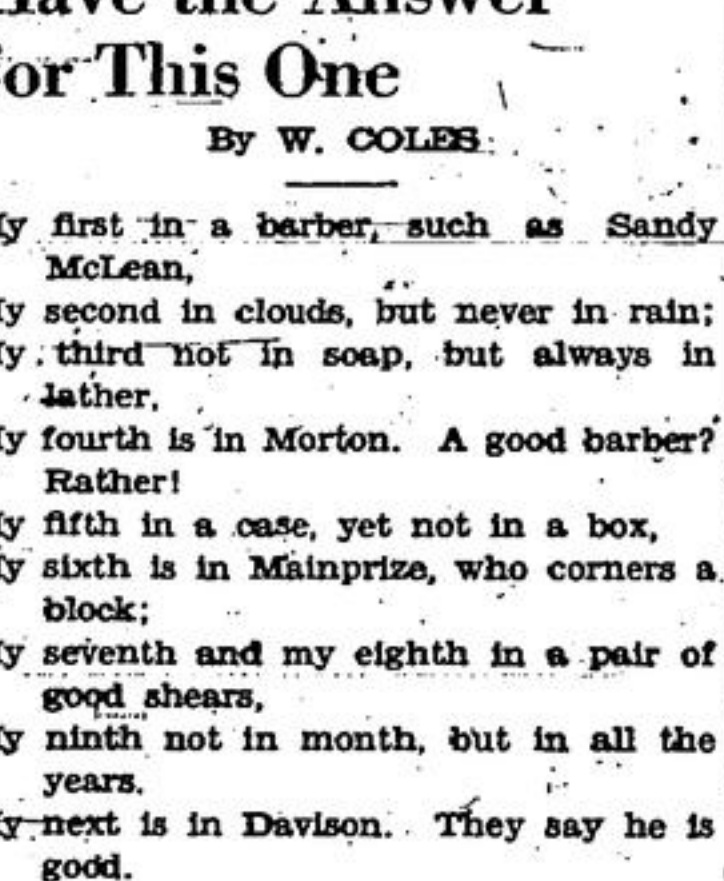

HOME FOR NEW DUTIES



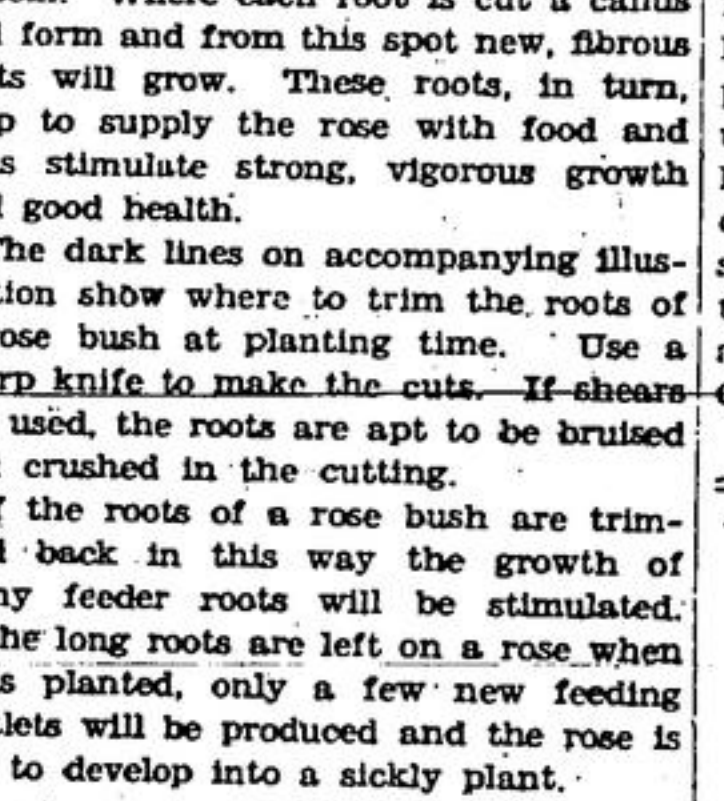

IN DRAMA OF THE SEA



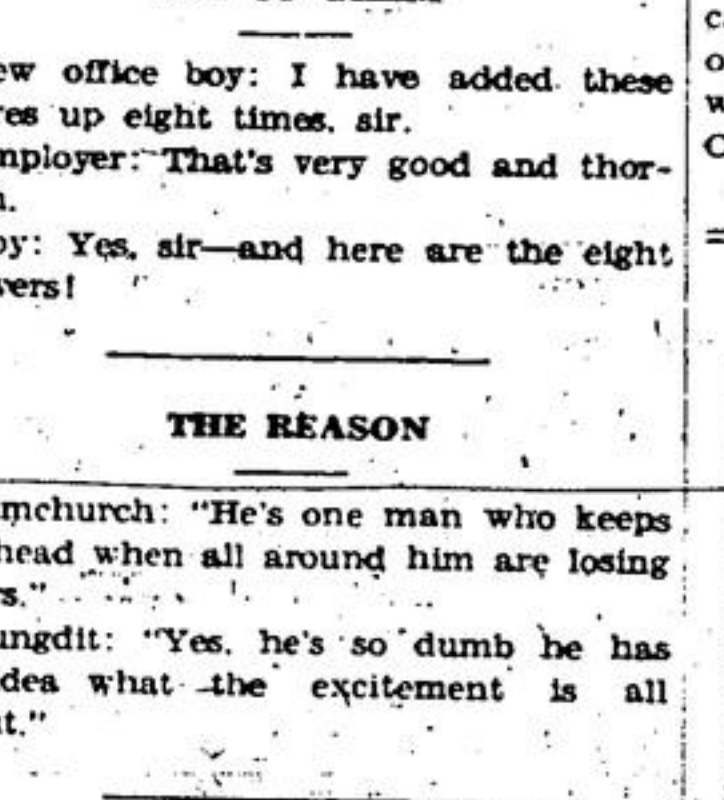

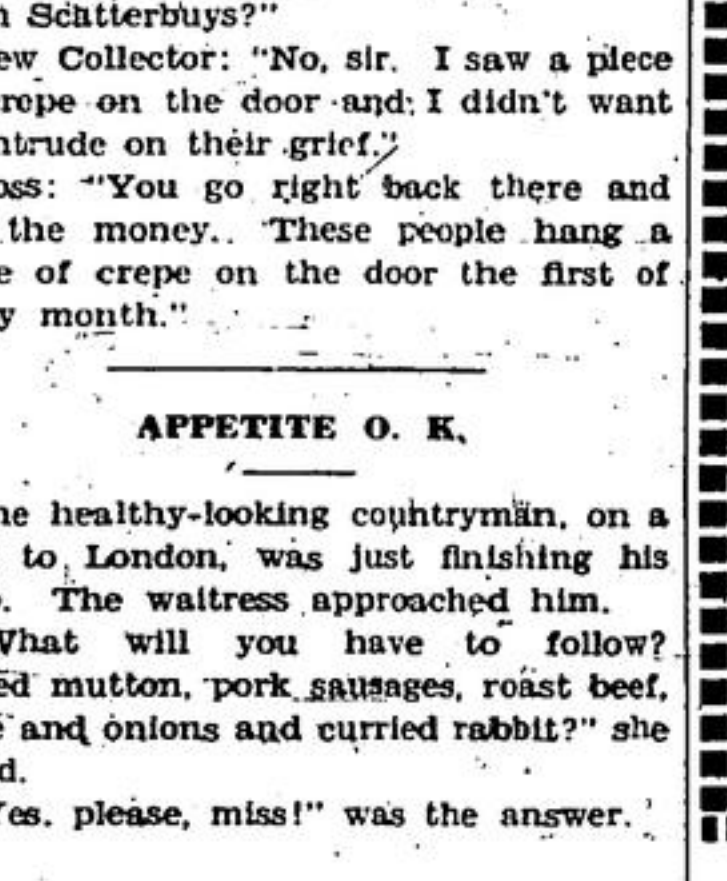
