## DEEP-SEA ANGLING OFF THE ATLANTIC COAST

Announcement of the third international tuna fishing tournament, to be held off the coast of southwestern Nova Scotia next September, reflects the growing interest in deep-sea angling. Teams of "big game" anglers represent in the British Empire, the United States and Cuba will pit their skill against one another—and against the big, swift, powerful tuna. The tuna enter Nova Scotia waters toward the end of June, striking the southern tip of the peninsula first, and then spreading northwards along the entire coast. July, August and September are the best months, but tuna are taken till late November.

Another big game fish that is attracting the attention of deep-sea anglers is the broadbill swordfish, which frequents the waters off the east coast of Cape Breton Island from early July till mid-September. A comparatively recent addition to the big game fish species, the swordfish takes its picturesque name from the fact that it carries a sword, which is really a prolongation of the upper jaw. This serves as a formidable weapon. Among the noted swordfishing centres are the Villages of Ingonish and Nell's Harbor, situated close to the New Cape Breton Highlands National Park.

## KINGMERE BIRD SANCTUARY ESTABLISHED

Establishment of Kingmere Bird Sanctuary in Hull County, Province of Quebec, under the Migratory Birds Convention Act, is announced by the Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa. The new sanctuary has an area of approximately 1,800 acres, comprising Kingmere Lake and some adjoining privately-owned lands, and its establishment was made possible through the co-operation of the Province of Quebec and up-land birds, especially song birds and property owners in the region.

This sanctuary area is frequented by insectivorous birds, and is similar to a number of other bird sanctuaries of this type that have been established in other places in the Laurentians and elsewhere in Canada. The killing, hunting, capturing, injuring, taking or molesting of migratory game, migratory insectivorous or migratory non-game birds, or the taking, injuring, destruction or molestation of their nests or eggs is prohibited at all times within the Kingmere Bird Sanctuary.

## FLYING THE UNION JACK

A good deal of ignorance prevails with regard to the proper way of flying the Union-Jack. As old soldiers and sailors, members of the Canadian Legion will naturally be expected to be able to advise their "citizen" fellow citizens on such a point, and the following should therefore be carefully noted: The flag should be at the masthead right side up, that is with the wide white border at the top. Flown upside down, it would be a signal of distress, quite out of place, of course, on the royal and festive occasions this month.

In government circles hope has been expressed that citizens will refrain from using the Royal Standard in decorations during the visit of the King and Queen. It is the King's personal flag, not a standard for general use. The Royal Standard was flown from Government House, Ottawa, while the King and Queen were in residence there; also from the King's limousine, and the engine of the royal train. The Legionary.
